
and small group gatherings not to mention, a little closer

Christ Church's Roof has a problem!

Just when you think that little matter of a big drip through the Gallery roof after a drop of rain in the winter has resolved itself as there've been no further drips, the roofer fixing it brings news that



there is a rather large hole in the roof on the north facing slope of the nave. Several courses of tiles have slipped away from the ridge tiles, and the crack is starting to extend along the whole of the external north face of the nave. Major work will be required to fix the problem. At time of writing (mid-August), we are waiting for the Structural Engineer's report before we can start work to deal with it. Look out for village e-mails for regular updates on the situation. In the meantime, please keep away from the north side of the church where you see the signs and hazard tape. 'Ride and Stride' for walkers and cyclists takes place in many counties across



the country to raise money for church restoration and repair through the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust (SCPT) which is a heritage charity, and it awarded Christ Church Coldharbour a grant this year towards the cost of essential organ repairs. The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of participating churches in their area. They map out their own route to visit churches by bike or on foot, and then get friends to sponsor them for a fixed amount per church visited. The

money that is collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church of the cyclists' choice; the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need (that apply for a grant).

ABINGER CONSOLIDATED CHARITIES –an update by Kim Clark Chair of Trustees

Earlier this year, I wrote an article introducing readers to the work of Abinger Consolidated Charities which provides financial assistance to the parishioners of the Ancient Parish of Abinger. Although the Charity is long established, it has worked in a very low-key way and so was unknown to many in the Community. Given that we are now facing a very serious cost of living crisis the assistance we can offer has become much more important and we are now being proactive in seeking out those who we could help. You will see our flyers in local shops, schools and doctors' surgeries.

As we move into the Autumn and Winter and the cost-of-living spirals many may find themselves struggling financially for the first time. We give Sainsbury's vouchers twice a year – in the run up to Christmas and in the Summer and are always happy to receive any new applications or referrals from Abinger Hammer, Abinger Common, Forest Green, Walliswood and Oakwood Hill.

Abinger Consolidated Charities can also offer additional one-off assistance over and above the gift of vouchers. Usually, one-off gifts are given to those who find themselves in difficulty due to a change of circumstances such as bereavement, long term illness or unemployment. We understand that many people find the process of asking for assistance difficult but be assured that we treat applications sensitively and in complete confidence and do not ask for any detailed personal financial information. Sadly, we cannot change people's circumstances but we hope to make things a bit easier at a difficult time. We will just chat things through to find the best way to be of assistance - whether it is settling a bill or buying white goods or whatever.

We are delighted to collaborate with **Dorking Food Bank** and we are one of their referral agencies. The Foodbank takes place at the Christian Centre, next to St Martin's Church in Dorking, on a Tuesday (4.45 to 5.45pm) and Thursday (2.30 to 3.30pm). Also available at that time is advice and support on fuel costs, debt advice and other support. Please get in touch if you would like a referral to Dorking Food Bank.

The Community Fridge also runs in the Christian Centre every weekday morning from 10 to 11.30am, with a variety of fresh food available.

New speed limits in the villages

Coldharbour makes the news

An article in The Times on 7th August entitled "**Put** the brakes on: no more zooming at 60mph through country roads" highlighted Coldharbour as an example of a rural village that suffers from traffic that is allowed to speed at 60mph along the narrow roads.



The Times reported that:

'Perched in the Surrey Hills in an area of outstanding natural beauty, the hamlet of Coldharbour is popular with day-trippers. Drivers coming from London must first watch their speed on the dual carriageway, yet once they enter Coldharbour they can let rip at 6omph. The twisting lane is plagued by joyriders on scrambler motorcycles and bangers who race to a cricket pitch up a rutted track, which, because it is a "byway open to all traffic", also has a legal limit of 6omph.'

Trying to get the speed limit dropped through both Abinger and Coldharbour has been an ongoing struggle which **Stuart McLachlan of Coldharbour** described to the Times reporter: "There are scrambler bikes roaring up and down at 60mph and there is absolutely nothing we can do about it. We also get joyriders in 4x4s coming at midnight, charging up and down the byways."

But at last change is on the way. This autumn, in what is claimed to be the first scheme of its kind, Surrey council will pilot limits of 20mph and 30mph across about 80 square miles for all the villages and lanes between Dorking and Guildford south of the A25.



Stuart, who sits on Capel Parish Council, has also been interviewed by local Radio Surrey on Tuesday 16th August.

He wants to make sure that it also applies to all the byways which are part of the public highways network.



WI July meeting

Communications Then and Now. Pat O Brien reports: We met in the Evelyn Hall for our July gathering. After signing up for the July lunch and the distribution of birthday cards, our speaker was introduced.

This time it was **Graham Mytton** from Coldharbour, a regular contributor and retired Coldharbour Reporter of this parish magazine. Graham is well qualified to talk on this subject as he has been in the communications business all his life; having held a number of different roles at the BBC: Studio

Manager, Producer, Researcher and Head of Audience Research for the BBC World Service as well as teaching and writing.

Graham began by presenting the history of mass communication. He gave a summary of developments from the first (Gutenberg) printing press in 1436, to the wireless and first radio broadcast in 1920 - recalling that in 1942 there was no TV, only printed newspapers, and a speedy and efficient mail service. Anything urgent was sent by telegram, and long-distance telephone calls were made via an operator. The first computer, which was enormous, was created at Iowa University that year, but it would be many years before mobile phones arrived and before there were computers in most homes.

Graham's post graduate research was on the use of mass media communication in Zambia and in African areas of conflict, with particular interest in Somalia (where BBC World Service broadcasts in the Somali language were and are very popular). Keen on technology they are major innovators. In 1960 there were 60,000 radio sets and by 1974 this had risen to 1.8 million! Today there is a huge use of mobile phones which has transformed people's business and personal lives. They now lead the world in online banking. Technology has taken over to such a degree that they may soon stop internal postal services. Finally, Graham shared stories and lively pictures of his work in Africa.

The talk was warmly appreciated, and the interesting afternoon was rounded off with the usual excellent tea provided by Annie Chesterton, Jan Hunt and Kathy Millar. Next meeting: 1st September 2.30 p.m. in the Wotton Hall with a talk on "Silk, Squalor and Scandal - Hogarth and his work" by Daphne Jefferis.

I've been a ranger with the National Trust for 3 years and previously worked for West Sussex County Council as a ranger for around 10 years. I'm mildly obsessed with trees and woodlands which has led me to volunteer in my spare time for the Ancient Tree Forum,



organising walks in different parts of Sussex looking at ancient and veteran trees. I also volunteer as a Tree Warden for my local parish council. One of the most interesting aspects of this area here isn't just the trees and woodlands (Abinger Roughs is home to real beauties), it's the number of butterflies and array of species that call Denbies Hillside home. One short walk from the office and I can see Chalkhill Blues, Marbled Whites, Skippers, Adonis Blues and more. A real treat! It's been great to meet some of the people involved in working the land here too. We work closely with the tenant farmers who are doing a great job with the conservation grazing in the meadows. We also have a superb team of volunteers who will turn their hand to anything to

News from Shere Surgery

FLU VACCINES- We are expecting delivery of our vaccine supply on the week commencing 19th Sept, so flu clinics will follow shortly after.

NHS 'Data Saves Lives' Data Strategy- the muchdelayed switch on for digital access to medical record is apparently going live on 1st November 2022. You will have access to your medial record for all new entries from that date, but not previous information. Clearly there are benefits



to holding your own digital health information, such as becoming ill when away. There is no current provision in the system to apply to those who are

vulnerable, so prior to November we will manually block sharing for these patients until suitable safeguards are in place.

We are pleased to welcome Dr Alex McEwen to the team! She is Marcus' wife and will be helping us out for a few months to provide maternity cover for DrBissell. We are already all getting mixed up with two Dr McEwens in the building! We also have 4 new GP trainees: Dr Ellie Balme, Dr Natalie Odedra & Dr Tom Bird (all of whom have been with us before) and Dr Amy Crossthwaite, who is brand new to General Practice.

Family History Cancer Project - this will hopefully be underway by the time you read this. We are so excited to be working in partnership with St George's Hospital to screen our 38–45-year-old population to assess their cancer risk. I will be sending a text to patients within this cohort inviting them to fill in a guestionnaire. This will identify low risk patients, who will be sent a reassurance leaflet and their personal risk level. This group will attend normal screening as they reach screening age. The rest will be offered a detailed family history assessment. This will identify moderate risk patients, who will be referred locally for enhanced screening (for example annual breast screening, instead of 3 yearly). The final group, deemed high risk, will be looked after going forward by the Genetics Dept at St George's, who will create an individual risk management plan for each patient. This is a fantastic opportunity for our patient group, which is why we were keen to engage. We really hope our population embrace this project. Please encourage anyone in this age cohort to complete the questionnaire. If you are in this group, have opted out of receiving texts, but would like to be involved, please contact me via AskmyGP. I hope to follow up on outcomes at the SALV Autumn Meeting and hope this encourages this age cohort to come along!
