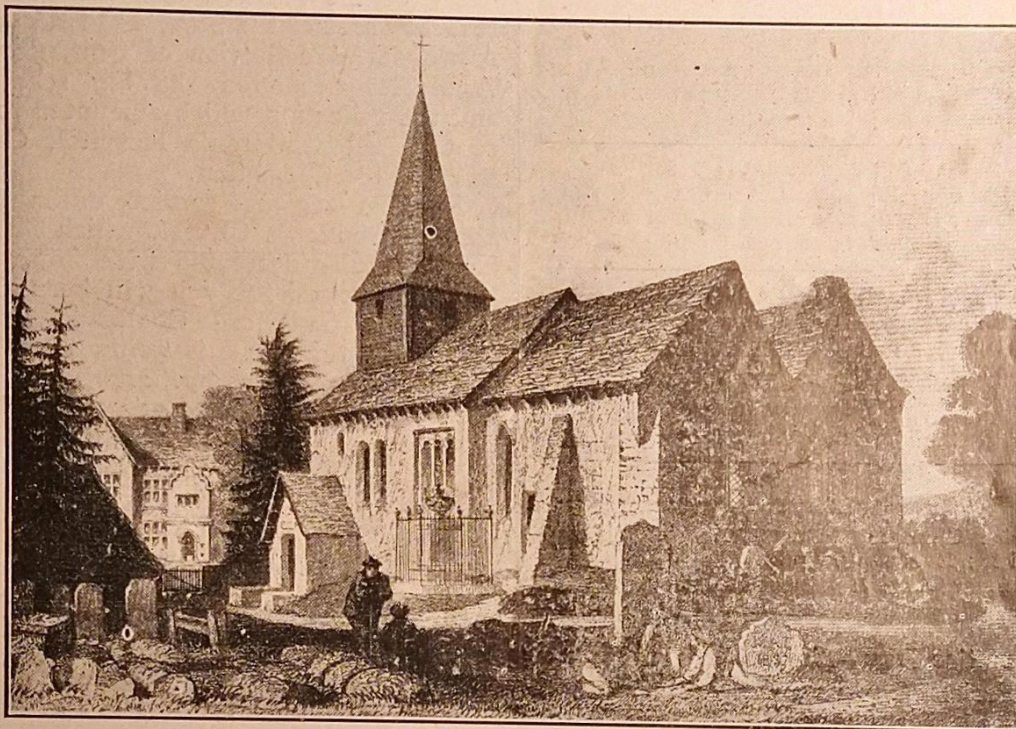

The great news for me and many of you is that we shall be able at long last to be back in the Parish Church for our first service on Sunday, November 11th—Armistice Day—at 11 a.m. We shall hold a special Service when we shall remember those who

have given their lives in this war just ended, together with those who fell in the Great War, 1914-18, when our collections as usual will go to Earl Haig's Fund.

### Abinger Common W.I.

REPORT OF MONTHLY MEETING,  
THURSDAY, OCTOBER 4TH, 1945.

Mrs. Lugard, President, in the chair, opened the meeting with a short prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and passed. Members were asked to give in names if they wished to avail themselves of the offer of seeds for sale.

An invitation was received from Westcott W. I. to four of our members for a gramophone recital at their next meeting, and an open invitation to the next group meeting.

The Treasurer's report showed a need for economy, if we are to show any balance in hand at the end of the year, after meeting all commitments.

There was some discussion on the great need of a Village Hall, and the desirability of enlisting the general interest of the village in the matter.
