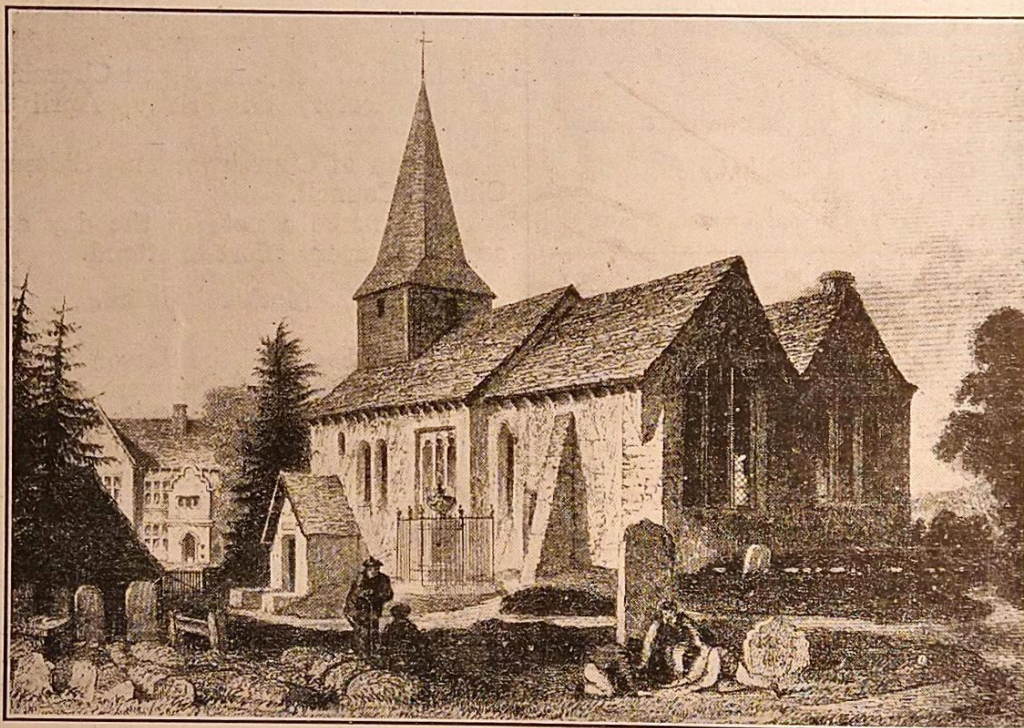

Christian Reconstruction in Europe.

"They shall build the old wastes, they shall raise up the former desolations, and they shall repair the waste cities."

Christian Churches throughout Europe have been in the forefront of the fight against Barbarism. Their struggle has not been for themselves but for the Church of Christ and as guardians of human values, of justice, liberty and truth.

They have fought to maintain Christian schools and youth organisations.

They have protested against the taking of innocent hostages. Church leaders have offered themselves in substitution for those arrested.

They have combated anti-Semitism and given succour to persecuted Jews.

Their casualties have been heavy. Some have been put to death or died in imprisonment. Others have languished in concentration camps. Christian schools and universities have been closed and training for the ministry forbidden.

There is a famine of Bibles and of Christian literature. Christian newspapers have been forced to cease publication. Churches and institutions have been destroyed by bombing. Christian funds have been confiscated.

But many men and women are secretly and courageously preparing themselves for Christian service and leadership in the post-war world.

They might say with St. Paul: "We are troubled on every side yet not distressed; we are perplexed but not unto despair; persecuted but not forsaken; cast down but not destroyed; always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body."

"Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven."
