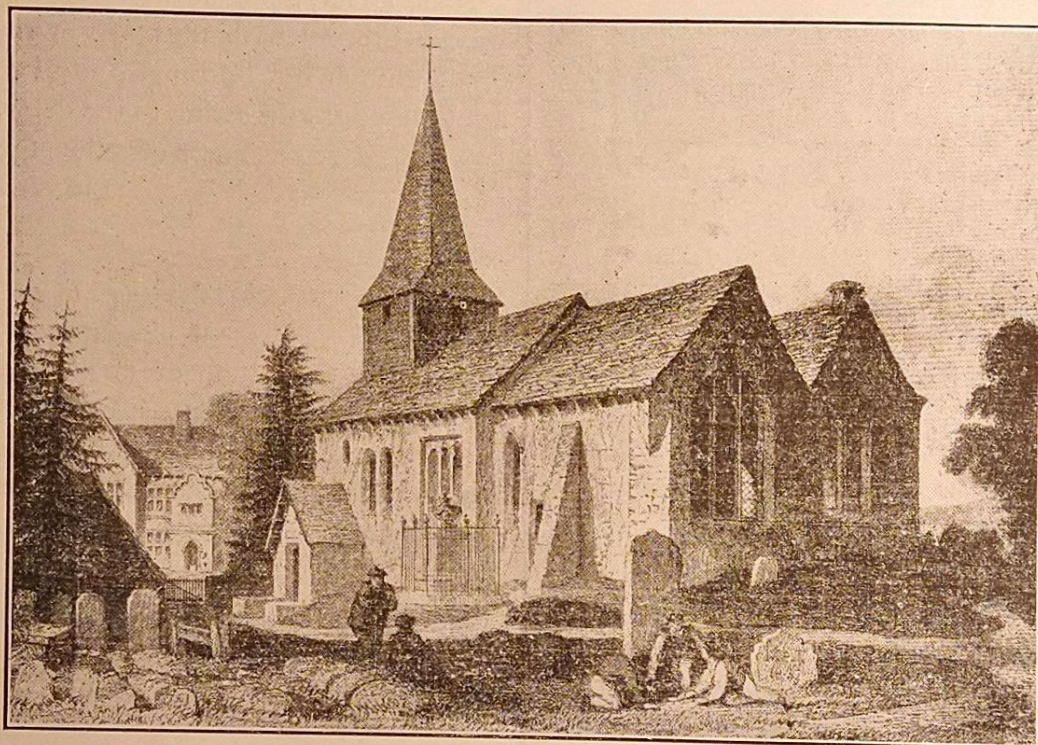

My dear people,

Mr. Etchells, the architect we have appointed to restore our Parish Church is visiting the site with the quantity surveyor in the course of the next few days, and after their visit they will send us a report which will give us some idea of the probable cost of the restoration.

As soon as this figure is known, we hope to draw up an appeal for the Bishop's Challenge Fund, which fund will, we hope, undertake to pay for the whole work of restoration and furnishing of the church together with a Village Hall. There are, I know, many in the village who are looking forward to this Hall as a village social centre, and I hope that as much money as possible will be given to the Challenge Fund, earmarked for the Village Hall. Some people still seem to be doubtful

as to whether we shall ever get this hall, and to them I should like to point out that any money earmarked for such a building will, of course, be refunded if the building does not materialise.

It is, I fear, going to be some time before we can proceed with the work of restoration of the Church, but I do appeal to all concerned not to lose interest owing to the delay.

MESSAGE FROM LEADERS OF THE CHURCHES.

The following statement has been issued by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, and the Moderator of the Free Church Federal Council:—

"All citizens of Great Britain have grounds for the deepest feelings of gratitude to the officers and men of the Royal Navy and the Merchant Navy. To their courage, endurance and vigilance, we owe our own preservation from want as well as the safe conduct of our forces to many parts of the world. It is fitting that on some Sunday the congregations in our churches should be asked to remember these specially in their prayers. In order that all may observe the same day, except where local conditions forbid, we ask that Sunday, July 21st, may be kept in this way as a day of thankful remembrance.

It is certain that on such a day the congregations in our churches will wish to contribute to the funds which exist to provide amenities and give financial aid to those

connected with the two services who may at any time be in need of help.
