

Rector's Letter.

My dear People,

I want to draw your attention to Sunday, July 21st, which has been appointed as a Day of Thankful Remembrance of the Work of the Royal Navy and the Merchant Navy by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, and the Moderator of the Free Church Federal Council.

On that day it is hoped that in every cathedral, church, and chapel in the land, our people will be mindful of the great debt we owe to our men of the sea, and it will be fitting that on the same Sunday we should especially remember them in our prayers and praises.

Our collections will be given on this day to King George's Fund for Sailor's, at the express wish of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

At the Society's Annual Meeting in April the Chairman said: "We must remember that the Seaman is still at grips with his old enemies, the sea and the weather. There are many wounded and disabled men who may never go to sea again, and many seamen's families bereaved during the war who may

still need our aid. Over and above the provision that the state is able to make, we are bound by every tie of honour and gratitude to support the Societies which exist to help such cases."

I trust we shall make this a real Day of Prayer and Thanksgiving, and that our collections will be as generous as possible.
