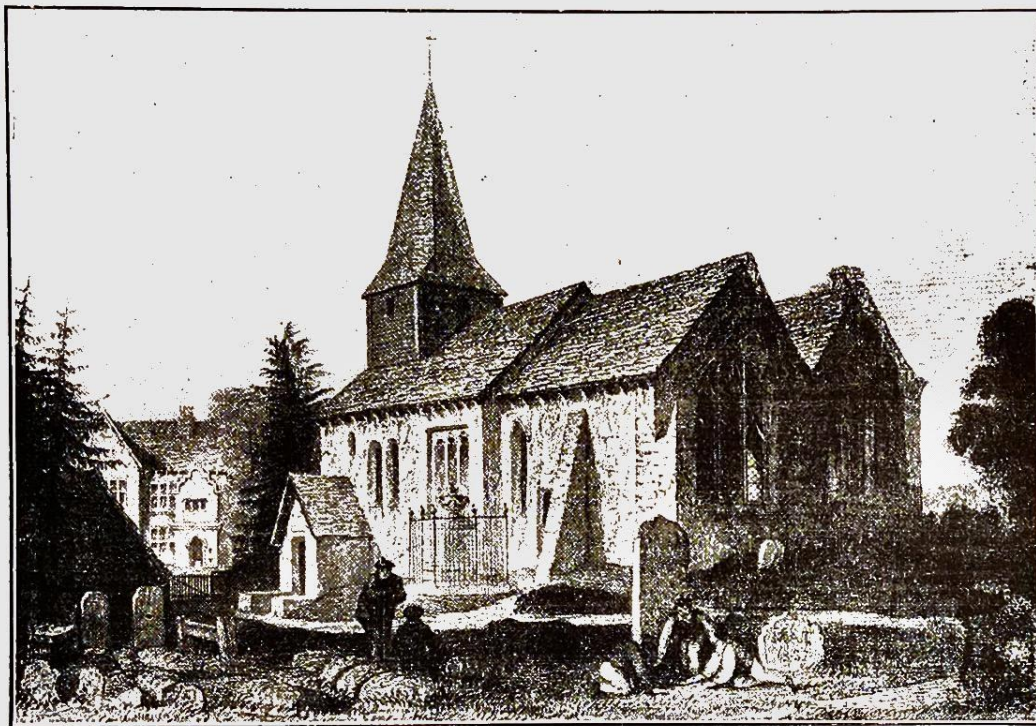

### **Farewell to Mr. E. M. Forster.**

On Monday, September 23rd, 120 friends of Mr. Forster foregathered at the Village Hall to say good-bye to one who has endeared himself to everyone during his long residence at West Hackhurst.

West Hackhurst has been his home for practically most of 70 years, and it was obviously a sad moment for Mr. Forster; his father having planned the house, and his aunt—Miss Forster—having built it; but, unfortunately, the property is only leasehold,

which has now expired, and other accommodation being impossible to find at the moment, not only has he to leave his beloved home, but also more far from the Abinger Hammer.

The farewell party was organised by the Anvil Youth Club, and an excellent evening was much enjoyed by all present. Old-time dances and games were held from 8 to 10.30 p.m.; every one enjoyed the spirit of the evening. The guest of honour—E. M. Forster—enjoyed the fun and games, and was to be seen dancing and playing games with many old friends.

An excellent mime was performed by Chisholm, Mr. Tallent, Miss June Wilson and Mr. Maurice Spratley, which caused much amusement.

At the end of the evening the Rector said a few farewell words on behalf of those present, and voiced the feelings of all by saying that Abinger Hammer was losing its best and dearest friend and was going to feel the loss of Mr. Forster, not so much for what he had done for the village, but what he had been to the village—its greatest friend and supporter in all its activities. The Rector thought that the Youth Club had rightly chosen as its name the Anvil, which seems to-day a more fitting name than the Hammer, as it was receiving a great blow and not giving it.

A book containing the names of 125 friends was then handed to Mr. Forster, who, with his usual charming humility, thanked all present both for the book and the delightful evening, both of which had given him great delight. He said it was indeed a sad day for him after so many years here, and he would always treasure the happiest memories of Abinger Hammer and its folk. Mr. Forster wished the Youth Club every success and happiness, and he hoped they would make one of their activities the keeping open of the paths and rights of way to the surrounding countryside, not forgetting the path through the coppice that adjoins West Hackhurst, which little wood had almost been such a joy to him, and which, he was glad to say, he still possessed, and he hoped it would be enjoyed by his many friends.

The evening closed with heart-felt singing of Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem.



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
