

#### Harvest Festival.

In spite of the inclement weather there seemed to be as great a quantity of flowers, fruit and vegetables, for the Harvest Thanksgiving Services, on the last Sunday in September. Owing to the limited space available in the North Chapel, it was only possible to have just simple decorations of flowers, which Mrs. Gibbs very kindly arranged suitably for the occasion.

The Hammer Mission Room seemed to have almost more garden produce than ever, and the flowers, fruit and vegetables were arranged most tastefully by Mrs. Bone, and the sheaves of corn and the bread completed a perfect Harvest offering. The services at the Hammer were especially well attended, and I think it was the most impressive service that I have ever conducted there.

The collections during the day amounted to £9 15s. 0d. in all, including £3 from the Mission Room, and £2 14s. 6d. from the Schools.

The Children's Festival was held at Abinger Common Schools on the Friday before the Church Festival, and we were glad to see so many parents and friends of the School present.

In a delightful little Harvest Service three short lessons were read by Fred Booker, Pat Roberts and Roddam Foreman, and read extremely well, and I should like to congratulate them on the reverent way they were delivered.

Here again there was a "mountain" of flowers, fruit and vegetables.

Thank you, Mrs. Carpenter, for all your care and trouble!

The produce from the festival was divided between Guildford and Dorking Hospitals, and both sent letters of appreciation in acknowledgement of the gifts. We were able, too, to send £4 17s. 6d. to each hospital. L.G.M.
