

### What is Lent all about?

Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, this year falling on February 22nd. Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by fasting, both from food and festivities.

## Dame Virginia McKenna

Excellent news! Longtime Coldharbour resident and a regular member of the Christ Church congregation, Virginia McKenna was appointed a Dame of the British Empire in the New Year honours list.

We share with many in congratulating Virginia on this very well deserved award, which

was for her work for Wild Animal Welfare and Compassionate Conservation.

In 1984, Virginia, together with her late husband Bill Travers and son Will Travers, established Zoo Check, which later became the Born Free Foundation, the name of the film about Elsa the lion club, starring Virginia and Bill as Joy and George Adamson, for which Virginia was awarded a Golden Globe. Her early films include A *Town Like Alice* for which she received a BAFTA. Virginia also starred on the stage, winning an Olivier Award for her role in *The King and I* (in which she played with Yul Brynner).

As well as being a wild life campaigner and star of screen and stage, Virginia is an author and poet, with *Into the Blue*, a history of dolphins and their relationship with people) and *Tonight the Moon is Red*, an anthology of her poems, among her published works.

Virginia responded to news of her award by saying "This award may be in my name, but I feel it really belongs to all those striving to end wild animal suffering and keep wildlife in the wild. Bill and I shared a belief in the power of one; one animal that needs rescuing; one species that needs protecting; one human community that needs supporting; one ecosystem that needs conserving. And the power that resides in each of us every day to do something about it. My husband Bill and I came to Coldharbour in 1957, after a two-year search for somewhere to live in the country. The little cottage we found, with its beautiful view, ended the search. Today I treasure it more than ever. And I know it means a lot to our children. Both Bill and my mother are buried in Christ Church Coldharbour's beautiful churchyard - always a place of peace and reflection."

### Riding for the Disabled



In 2022 the Horsley, Bookham & Leatherhead Riding for the Disabled Association opened its doors to its new, all weather indoor riding centre in Effingham. A brand-new, purpose-built arena and classroom, to meet the needs of our riders with a range of physical and learning disabilities, who come weekly for therapeutic horse-riding sessions.

Riding for the Disabled Association is there to serve the needs of local children & young adults. Our goal is to allow those to gain access to affordable horse riding to help improve not only their physical strength but also improved flexibility, balance and coordination.

Additional benefits come from the riders' mental health and wellbeing, allowing them to feel safe, connected and liberated on horseback. At Horsley, Bookham & Leatherhead RDA, many of our riders are autistic or have severe learning disabilities, and we see, each week, progress that not only impacts their riding but feeds into the rest of their day-to-day life & education.

"It is a very humbling experience working with the RDA. It is an incredible honour to bear witness to the development we see in the children as they grow in confidence and ability. It takes a lot of courage to trust a horse and strangers and these children are an inspiration to me. I walk away from each session with a full heart." – 2022 Volunteer.

With over 90 regular riders, but an evergrowing wait list, we are always looking for new volunteers. With our 10 gorgeous and well-behaved ponies, we require 3 volunteers per rider to ensure a safe and enjoyable session for all.

Volunteering can be for just a few hours each week, within school term time, so ideal for those who want to meet new friends, connect with inspiring children and get some gentle

### Mid-Surrey Community Fridges (Dorking Fridge)

I help out at the warehouse on a Monday and Tuesday unloading the food from vans, and then sorting and putting into crates for re-distribution.

Mid Surrey Community Fridges was first opened in September 2017 to offer a solution to food waste by re-distributing surplus food and to help reduce the shocking level of food poverty they saw within the community. The Community Fridge team collects food from local supermarkets, businesses and surplus food charities.

### Are we a food bank? The answer is no!

- Food banks help people who have been referred to them out of crisis.
- Community Fridges have food available to anyone; by taking the food you are diverting food from landfill and saving the planet!

We now have three fridges, our original site in the Dorking Christian Centre, our second site in the Harvest Church on Goodwyns and our third site in the Leatherhead Community Hub which opened in early 2019. We also have a refrigerated van, the Mobile Fridge, which serves many rural communities in Mole Valley and a small warehouse in Dorking.

Little did we realise the huge impact our operation would have for our volunteers and for our visitors. Our survey this year showed that 90% of our users felt closer to their community as a result of visiting us and we are helping Mole Valley DC to administer the Household Support Fund as we are reaching those 'quiet' people who are struggling to put food on the table and who don't quite qualify for help. We are currently saving around 5.5 tonnes of food from being wasted every week and it is all distributed from our Dorking warehouse. That works out at around 750 bags of food each week.

### How can you help?

- Volunteer with us: back office, packing crates in our warehouse in Dorking, helping to run the different distribution sites, van driving
- Tell people about us, especially people who are struggling at the moment

One final message. Our food is available to everyone who can use it. There is no qualification necessary. We suggest a donation of £2.50 per bag of food to help us with our considerable costs and please feel free to donate!

### Tribute to Kevin Burt, an "Abinger Villager"

Kevin was born on 8<sup>th</sup> February, 1952 in Dorking and his childhood was spent as a Surrey boy. As a young man he worked for R. Coe as a foreman at the Watercress Beds, where he met Frankie, the love of his life. They married in 1973 and had two children, Matthew and Helen.

This year they would have been celebrating their Golden Wedding Anniversary. Kevin and Frankie moved into Evelyn Cottages in 1978, contributing so much to our community over 44 years, always generous with time and commitment.


As their children grew up, frequent trips to the Village Green for football and cricket games, often with other children joining in led to Kevin being approached by the then Rector, John Venus, to form a Youth Club for the children in the village. This became 'The Acorns'. Football, cricket, bowling, games evenings at The Rectory and coach trips to the seaside became the

norm. Fun days – happy memories!

During this time the Youth Club were asked to clear the pond of duckweed. This resulted in ducks and duckhouse being acquired. Kevin and family became the duck guardians for many years, with twice daily visits to keep them fed and safely put away at night.



Sadly, with an increase of road traffic deaths and the occasional fox helping himself to supper, a decision was made not to continue with them.



For many years, the Raffle and prizes at the Abinger Medieval Fair was in the hands of our very own Friar Tuck (Kevin) assisted by his Maid Marian (Frankie) who were great at encouraging people to part with their money.

When Kevin's health started to fail, he showed courage in facing life, always with a smile, always ready for a cheeky banter - he loved to converse on football and his passion for horse racing.

Family always came first with Kevin. He adored his son and daughter Matthew and Helen, Katrina his daughter-in-law, three grandsons- Aaron, Joshua and Harry. He was godfather to friends' children and Uncle Kevin to numerous others. Above all he was devoted to his wife Frankie.




I tell the children, that it is every day, in every way, we have the chance to build ourselves up in incremental steps to become the best versions of who we can be and be the best for all those who are around us.

### **Dorking Museum Half-Term Family Activity**

The Museum remains closed while necessary roof repairs are carried out following October's fire in an adjacent building.



On Tuesday 14th February, 2pm-5pm, Dorking Library is hosting the Museum's half-term family event which marks the 40th anniversary of the discovery of Dorking's most famous dinosaur, the *Baryonyx*. The unearthing of its giant claw by fossil hunter Bill Walker in 1983 created a worldwide sensation because the

dinosaur was completely unknown to science. Today, the original skeleton is in the Natural History Museum and Baryonyx (meaning 'heavy claw') even featured in a Jurassic World movie. The dinosaur was named Baryonyx walkeri in Bill's honour.

Come along to see the story of the discovery of the Baryonyx, a life-size replica of the giant claw, models to show what the dinosaur would have looked like and items on loan from Bill's family including the original rock hammer that prised it out of the ground. Meet our young fossil enthusiast, Charlie, with some of his amazing collection of fossils and dino-bones. There will also be dinosaur art and craft activities and children will be invited to take part in the creation of a large Baryonyx artwork for the library wall!

When I finish my training I want to get a paid Saturday/weekend/part-time job, maybe on the till in Lidl or in a coffee shop.

During the week I go to college full-time and I'm completing a motor mechanics course."

# Robin's Gardening Tips for February



Despite the weather, signs of spring are appearing with snowdrops, daffodils and primroses coming into bloom. Bulbs do become crowded over time and snowdrops in particular can benefit from lifting and splitting on a regular basis. As soon as the flowers are over and before the foliage dies back, lift the bulbs, divide and replant as soon as possible. Bulbs planted like this, in the green, do far better than dry bulbs in the autumn.

If you have hellebores in your garden it is recommended that all old leaves be removed, clearing possible diseased leaves and allowing flowers to be seen more easily.

Once the soil starts to dry out (hopefully soon!) early crops of broad beans and peas can be sown directly into the ground, but do cover them with fleece or even newspaper, as you will probably be watched by the pigeons who will think they are for them.

If you have sown sweet pea seeds, do not forget to pinch back emerging plants once they have 2 pairs of true leaves. You will then get better flowers on the emerging side shoot.

**Sunday 19th February – Mrs Harris Goes to Paris** is a comedy-drama based on the 1958 novel by Paul Gallico. Lesley Manville plays Mrs Harris, a kind-hearted war widow who cleans houses for rich people in Chelsea, and who falls in love with one of her client's beautiful Dior dresses. She resolves to scrimp and save until she can buy one herself, then packs herself off to Paris where various obstacles get in her way. This intoxicating parade of high fashion adds a sumptuousness and elegance that elevates the entire film. This is a feel-good fairy-tale – enjoy! Thursday 2nd March - Amsterdam is loosely based on a little-known attempt by some wealthy American businessmen to overthrow President Franklin D Roosevelt in 1933. # The Diary of a Coldharbour Shepherdess (learning on the job)

It's January and the rain has been absolutely incessant. But...no winter lasts forever, and no spring skips its turn!

What a shepherdess & her flock would actually prefer, more than this constant rain, would be a decent bout of sub-zero temperatures which does a great job of killing off all the gastro worms in the ground that blight the sheep intestines and causes so much damage to their organs (unless we worm them regularly). However, so far we have had days and days of rain which is a breeding ground for lung worm and foot rot - thankfully no cases so far (touch wood!) and the flock are bearing up well and keeping most of their weight on.

Sheep are ruminants, which means they heat their body by eating, and if they can't eat enough they start losing their condition. I have 38 sheep and right now I am getting through 3 bales of hay a day! If we bought this hay - that would be £15 / day on hay – thank goodness we make our own in those long balmy sunny days and store it away in a barn for these deep, dark winter months.

But I feel like a celebrity when I enter the field and a flock of lovely, shaggy, muddy sheep stampede towards me - relying on their shepherdess for food, and cuddles! It was whilst having a cuddle that I noticed my oldest sheep - 11 years old had a slightly droopy mouth and I discovered a large mass on the gum. We bought this sheep in 2013 as a 1 year old male sheep for the freezer. Two facts changed his outcome: 1) he

turned out to be a she, and a pregnant she, and we called her Ellie (and her lamb Todd!) 2) I didn't realise how attached I would get to my sheep! So, 10 years later I got the vet out this week and she removed the mass. I'm not sure what the outcome will be for Ellie as she's quite an old lady now, but an old lady in great condition – I don't know how many 11 year old ewes there are in the British Isles, probably not too many!

She gave us the history of the invention of a metal detector by a Frenchman in 1874, and then of a portable detector, of the kind used today, in 1925, and its uses in wartime, notably in locating mines. She described the equipment needed and the legal requirements. First, obtaining the permission of the landowner to operate on their land, and determining - if anything of value is found - how to divide the "profit", usually 50/50 between finder and landowner. Then the requirement to report any significant finds to the local Finds Liaison Officer, who in turn report to the British Museum. Anything of particular interest can be found on the British Museum Portable Antiquities website. Open and particularly ploughed fields are desirable sites, a lot of objects are detected, and the most frequent finds are of coins, particularly Roman coins. Coins are Rob Page's speciality, and he had brought a large collection of local finds of coins for us to see. It was emphasised that detectorists are not, in general, in it for the money but for the historical interest, often giving finds to museums. There is an official definition of 'treasure', which depends on age, at least 300 years old, intrinsic value (e.g. gold or silver) and the number of such finds in one location. Predictably, some of the guestions at the end related to the TV series, and Frances said that this accurately portrayed metal detecting.

The illustrated talk was followed by the usual delicious tea.

Next meeting: Thursday, 2nd February at the Wotton Hall at 2.30 p.m. at which a Mole Valley officer will give a talk on Recycling.



#### LOCAL HISTORY

## Leith Hill Tower 1903

From The Wotton Quarterly Magazine, August 1903

"In 1766, Richard Hull, of Leith Hill Place, obtained leave from Sir John Evelyn (the second baronet of Wotton) to build a prospect tower on Leith Hill. Mr. Hull, on his part, undertook to keep up a pond for the use of the cattle turned



out on the common. Mr. Hull died January 18th, 1772, and is buried in the Tower.

From the inscription on his tomb (now buried under cement) it appears he was a native of Bristol, and had served many years in the parliament of Ireland. We also learn that 'he lived, in the earlier part of his life, in habits of intimacy with Pope, Trenchard, Bishop Berkeley, and many other shining characters of those times'.

After Mr. Hull's death the Tower passed into the possession of Mr. Harry Thompson, an Oporto merchant. Mr. Thompson died in 1795 or 6, and the next owner of the tower was Mr. Perrin. Mr. Perrin added a coping and battlement to the Tower, which had by this time fallen into decay, as the persons employed by Mr. Hull to build the Tower did their work so badly.

About the beginning of the last century the interior of the building was used by gypsies, poachers, and other undesirable characters, to the great annoyance of Mr. Perrin, who then had the interior filled with cement, thus covering up the tomb-stone of Richard Hull. The interior staircase by which visitors had been accustomed to ascend to the top was also covered up. In this state the Tower continued until by deed dated August 4th, 1863, Josiah Wedgwood, Esq., of Leith Hill Place, conveyed to the present Mr. Evelyn, of Wotton, two pieces of land together with Leith Hill Tower.





The new possessor of the Tower wished to have the cement removed and the interior staircase reopened so as to fulfil the object of Mr. Hull in building the tower as a prospect tower. The cement, however, was so hard that the design was practically impossible. Mr. Evelyn, then, with a view of enabling the public once more to ascend to the top of the Tower, constructed an exterior staircase turret for that object. Mr. Evelyn also raised the Tower somewhat higher.

In January, 1899, the custody of the Tower was intrusted by Mr. Evelyn to Mr. Henry Roffey, the landlord of the Leith Hill Hotel, which is situated at the base of the southern declivity of the hill, and under the good and courteous management of Mr. Roffey visitors may see the Tower and enjoy the view from the summit for two pence. On Mr. Roffey devolves the expense and responsibility of keeping the building in good repair.

In regard to Mr. Richard Hull it may be incidentally mentioned that he belonged to a dining out club whose members used to meet at Wotton Hatch. Among the members were Colonel William Evelyn, of Send, Surrey (a son of Sir John Evelyn, first baronet of Wotton) and Mr. Lee Steere, of Jayes (ancestor of Henry Lee Steere, Esq., of Jayes, the present representative of the Steere family).

On the exterior wall of the Tower is a Latin inscription recording the building of the Tower by Richard Hull in 1766, and over the entrance to the turret is another Latin inscription recording the building of the turret in 1863 by the present Lord of the Manor of Wotton. The height of the Tower is 56 ft. 3-ins., (Leith Hill being 966 feet above the sea level), and the view from the top embraces nearly a dozen counties. To the south the view includes the counties of Surrey, Sussex and Kent, and through an opening in the South Downs the sea is frequently visible. To the north may be seen the North Downs, and beyond this range the most prominent points in Berks, Oxfordshire, Middlesex, Bedfordshire, and Herts, are discernible, while to the west one looks into Hampshire and Wilts. Leith Hill is computed to command a view of not less than two hundred miles in circumference."



#### The Coldharbour Parish Magazine of 1892

Mr and Mrs Longhurst of Capel, formerly of Japonica Cottage, gave me a book published in 1892 that was owned by the then Christ Church Vicar, Reverend John Rooker. The latter part of the book includes the monthly Parish Magazine for the year, and excerpts of the corresponding months will feature in this year's Parish News. There are many parallel concerns with our own times, though the Magazine has a more authoritarian tone, admonishing parishioners to lead a more sober and industrious life. Influenza is the pestilence of the time and advice is given to "... be careful, live regularly, keep in good condition....and do not panic".

#### JANUARY/FEBRUARY 1892

Henry Elliott Malden Esq. writes the first Monthly Letter of the year "pro tem." Because of the absence of the Vicar, who, it transpires, will be absent for most of the year, due to his and his family's ill health. Henry: Churchwarden. Historian. Lecturer. Chairman of the Cricket club, Chairman of the Band Member of the Temperance Society, produced Churchwardens' Receipts & Expenditure, together with a scolding (see right).



The Churchwardens have no desire to go into debt again, and if some cold Sunday the congregation find that there is no fire or light for want of money to pay for them, the Churchwardens must not be blamed.

He reminds parishioners of educational opportunities, starting off with a lecture in January in Dorking Town Hall on the History of the English Bible and Common Prayer Book, illustrated by an Oxy-hydrogen Lantern. And warns people to get there early, as the Town Hall only seats 700 and the lecture is expected to be a sell-out.

Henry, with all his hats, is very involved in village life and notices "A Junior branch of the Drum & Fife Band appears to have started itself. Their penny whistles and toy drums discoursed sweet music in the neighbourhood and several tunes were clearly distinguishable. Every spontaneous effort of the kind, however humble in its beginnings, deserves encouragement."




