own choosing – and we do like to be busy don't we?!



Electoral Roll

Every year our churches have to review and update our Electoral Roll.

What is this, I hear you ask?! And why might I consider being on it?!

What is the Electoral Roll?

It is your parish church's register of electors. In the same way that being on the civic Electoral Roll allows you to vote in parliamentary and local elections and referenda, joining the Church Electoral Roll means that you can vote on Church matters, attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and stand for election to the PCC.

Do I have to join?

You can, of course, be a full and active member of St. James and Christ Church without joining the Roll. Being on the Electoral Roll does not entail signing up to any additional commitments, however, it does help the Church show its strength. Representation on the governing bodies of the church depends on the number on the Electoral Roll. Joining the Roll is compulsory if you wish to:

- Stand for election to the PCC or other synodical council (such as the Deanery, Diocesan or General Synod)
- Attend the APCM and participate in votes

What does the Electoral Roll affect?

The maximum number of PCC lay members. If the Roll is not representative this means that the PCC is too small for the workload involved, putting heavy strain on the members.

The Church of England is governed by a synodical system which joins with the Bishops to make decisions. Being on the Electoral Roll is the entry point and Christians share an individual responsibility to be part of the "Body of Christ" and to participate fully in our part of His Church. This system is intended to enable church people at every level to be in touch with the Church as a whole and to play their part in decision making. Also, the system is intended to ensure that the laity have their place in every aspect of church life, including doctrine and services. The Electoral Roll does NOT have a direct bearing in the way the Parish Share is assessed – it is based on estimated membership and socio-economic factors.

Do I qualify for the Roll?

To apply for the Electoral Roll you must meet ALL the following conditions:

- You must be aged 16 or over (though you can apply in the year you become 16 and your name will be entered once your birth date has passed).
- You must be baptised.
- You must be a member of the Church of England and EITHER live in the parish OR have attended a church in the parish regularly for at least 6 months.

Why join the Electoral Roll?

Joining the electoral roll is an important way of confirming your commitment to St. James and the Christ Church community and to the vision of the churches. But it also opens up the way for greater involvement in the life of the Church of England, at Deanery, Diocesan and national levels. By joining, you become entitled to participate in the government of the church and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, where the elections take place for the parochial church council or the parish's representatives on the deanery synod. In addition, those who live outside the Parish but are on the Electoral Roll enjoy all the rights and privileges that go with being resident in the parish (for example, baptisms and weddings). However, if you live outside the Parish and want to come onto the Electoral Roll, you must have been worshipping at your chosen church for a minimum period of six months. Numbers are important in the present climate in which the Church of England needs to be aware of the commitment of its people. Church morale is affected by statistics and while it would be wrong to inflate the significance of the Roll it would be a missed opportunity to ignore it. Joining the roll is an important statement of witness and a step along the path of discipleship. With your name on the electoral roll, the strength of the Church can be seen in our local area, and across the Diocese. If you're a regular St James or Christ church, you should be on the electoral roll!

ABINGER SCHOOL SITE

An update from the Diocese of Guildford –

Following on from our update in September, we can now let you know the next steps with the former school site in Abinger.

As a former Church of England school, the site is held in trust for the purposes of Church of England education. When the site is no longer needed for this purpose, the Diocese is required under Charity Commission regulations, to seek best value from the site for the purpose of Church of England education across the wider Diocese.

The Diocese have now appointed Savills to market the site and to receive any enquiries about it. Any parties that are interested in the site should contact Savills directly at their Guildford Office on 01483 796 80.

It is customary that, when a Church of England school site is sold, a small percentage of the sale proceeds are returned to the Parochial Church Council (PCC) of the local church so that some of the funds can be invested in activities which will support the mission of the church to children and young people. It will be up to the PCC to decide how to use these funds within the parish and local community. This proved to be a popular success for the composer, and it is distinguished by a lovely waltz and a very moving elegy among its four movements. 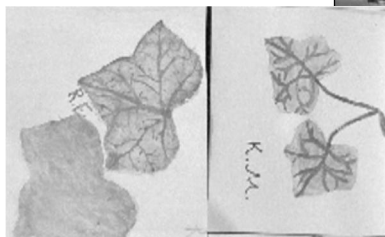


All the children from KS2 took part in the Chicken wired workshop.

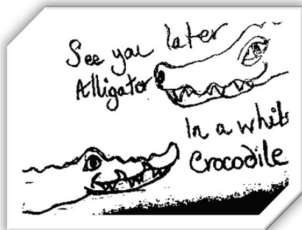

The Diary of a Coldharbour Shepherdess

(learning on the job) by Joanna Chaytor

February has brought lots of beautiful weather - cold and sunny, lots of hay runs - making sure the sheep are never without ample hay, and lots of foot care due to issues from the weeks of wet weather. Foot care involves cleaning the offending foot in a warm salted-water bath, then I cut back the hoof wall, and apply foot spray to the bit in-between their toes - this normally resolves the lameness. If required I give them a quick shot of painkiller, and if infection is present they may require a fast acting antibiotic. However, I never ignore foot issues on my flock.



Exciting news - next weekend we scan our 4 ewes for pregnancy! I chose my ewes and ram collaboration carefully - for me their wool is my main interest - the colour, the spirals and the length - I am trying to breed the perfect wool sheep! I chose 2 Herdwicks and 2 Icelandic ewes to go with Forest the ram - the very friendly white ram who will hand out cuddles and kisses to strangers (and a little more to a ewe in season...!).

This Saturday we will find out what we can expect from this dalliance they had in October. I always like to make a quick prediction, so I say - 2 twins, 1 single and 1 empty (a rather disparaging, slightly insensitive, word they use for livestock if there is no patter of tiny hooves...). In previous years we have had many shocks with our scans! One year they all scanned empty - horror! It turned out Herdwicks ovulate later (who knew - not me!) - evolution has told Herdwick ewes that if have their little lambs on the side of a Lake District mountain (where Herdwicks originate from) in February the chances are the little lamb won't survive those bitter elements. So, they ovulate later in the year than other sheep, and give birth April onwards - clever sheep.

Meanwhile, in other news - Ellie (the ewe with the growth on her gum) is doing well and enjoying being able to eat uninhibited!

Lastly, the boys must be hearing that precious sound - the sound of grass growing - they are more interested in the grass than the hay. Spring is literally round the corner!!

Robin's Gardening Tips for March

Despite the recent milder spell, don't be tempted to sow seeds in the ground yet. The old advice to check the warmth of the soil prior to planting was to sit down on the ground with a bare behind! Not really recommended.

Nature has a way of catching up and I am preparing to sow some vegetable seeds in the greenhouse—tomatoes, melons, peppers, chillis and aubergines especially.



If, like me, you find that with the recent very cold weather hydrangeas have suffered, hold off pruning or cutting back for a few weeks yet, then cut back to a healthy outward facing bud. However, pruning can be done of apple and pear trees, also roses. Don't touch stone fruit trees as they should be pruned mid-summer to prevent infections, especially silver leaf.

If you had mistletoe in the home for Christmas, by now the berries should be ripe and can be rubbed into cracks in the bark of host trees. Though it may take several years before you can cut your own mistletoe it is fun to try and grow your own.

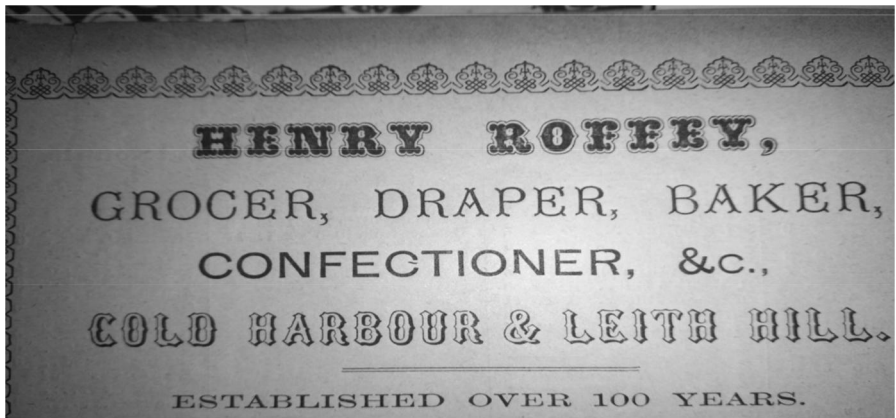

Every month, **Henry Roffey** took a third of the single advertising page.



The two other regulars were:

J.L. Playfoot: 85-86 High Street, Dorking - General Drapery and Family Mourning and an "...agent for Dr. Jaeger's Sanitary Clothing." Dr Jaeger advocated it was healthier to only wear animal fibres (wool) close to the skin, rather than plant (cotton and linen). In 1884, Lewis Tomalin, having capitalised on the craze for woollen longjohns, expanded the range with woollen suits. This was the beginning of the Jaeger Fashion brand, with the camelhair coat being their invention.

L.H. and W. Saubergue: 98 High Street, Dorking – Manufacturing Ironmongers, Bell Hangers, Gas & Hot Water Engineers, Tent Makers. In 1868, Lewis Saubergue was one of the first British men to buy a foot-propelled velocipede, a 'boneshaker' due to its construction of iron, wood and no springs. Unsurprisingly, Lewis drew large crowds when he toured Germany on it in 1870. One can only hope his woollen underwear kept him healthy. By 1892, thousands were coming to cycle on Box Hill and Ranmore, especially after the Daily Telegraph wrote that "Dorking cannot be surpassed as a centre for excursions." And two-week festivals were being held at summer camps. Which probably did wonders for Lewis's tent business.

W.H. Barker, a butcher from Holmwood, only advertises once, undoubtedly aiming for the gentry "Families waited on Daily at Cold Harbour." He would know their needs, as along with other shopkeepers, farmers and wealthy landowners within 20 miles of Beare Green, he was a member of the 'Beare Green Society for the Prosecution of Thieves' which provided mutual insurance and paid rewards, on conviction, to safeguard their property, except for gaming and highway robbery.

19th July 1873 Fatal Accident on Abinger Roughs.

Many people who walk their dog on Abinger Roughs will have seen this monument to Bishop Samuel Wilberforce 1803-1873, who fell from his horse on 19th July 1873 whilst riding with Lord Granville.



Samuel Wilberforce 1870

Samuel was born at Clapham Common, the 5th child of William Wilberforce, the great campaigner against slavery and the slave trade. Samuel was one of the great speakers of his day. He is remembered for his famous speech in opposition to Charles Darwin's Theory of Evolution. At a debate with Thomas Huxley in 1860, Huxley 'Are you related to an ape on your grandfather's or your grandmother's side?'



A great friend of Gladstone, he was riding to meet him in Holmbury St Mary, which had become very popular with rich Londoners. He had had two heart attacks in 1870 and 71 and he died instantly where he fell. The family erected this granite memorial. He's buried in Lavington next to his wife and there is another memorial to him in Winchester Cathedral designed by George Gilbert Scott.

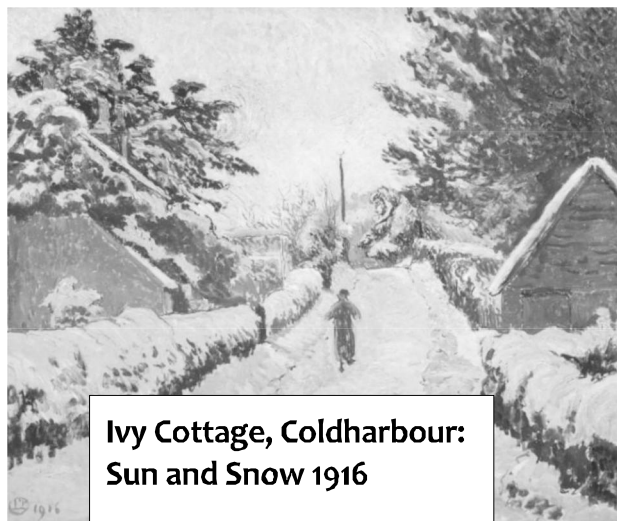
1916 Lucien Pissarro's Coldharbour Connection

Lucien, son of the better-known Camille, came to Coldharbour for a year from November 1915 to July 1916 and lodged with Mrs Ansell of Ivy Cottage, during which time he became a British citizen.

His father Camille Pissarro had five sons: Lucien, Georges, Félix, Ludovic-Rodolphe and Paul-Emile. To the dismay of Camille's wife Julie, who was concerned about her children's financial future, all of them followed in their father's footsteps and took up art at an early age. Thus, Pissarro became the master of an informal art school within his own family.

The Stern Pissarro Gallery in St James, London lists 13 artists with the name Pissarro and there may be more. Leila Pissarro, Camille's great granddaughter

is co-owner of the gallery. She is an active painter and art dealer.



**Ivy Cottage, Coldharbour:
Sun and Snow 1916**

Lucien Pissarro had a long and extraordinary life. Born in Paris in 1863 he moved to London in 1883 to learn English and made a living working for a publisher of music. He returned to Paris and began an active career as a painter. But he often returned to London and finally

shortly before the Great War, settled in England. According to the book 'A Catalogue of the Oil Paintings of Lucien Pissarro' published in 1983, 21 oil paintings of Coldharbour were produced during the months January to July 1916, and a further 2 were painted later from sketches.

His painting 'Teatime Coldharbour 1916' is on show in an art gallery in Brisbane and caused great interest when Emma Nelson posted it on Coldharbour Facebook from her travels in Australia. (See Emma's article)

In 2016, shortly before the centenary of Pissarro's time in Coldharbour, several villagers thought it might be a good idea to try to mount an exhibition of as many of his paintings and pastel sketches as could be put together. The owners of some of the better-known paintings, including the Tate and the Manchester Art Gallery, agreed in principle. Also, the current owner of "Coldharbour from Roffys" was interested in cooperating. However, we did not then have anywhere in the village with the requisite security demanded so had to abandon the idea. I think we should ask the National Trust at Leith Hill House– maybe now it might be possible for the 110th anniversary in 3 years time?

Lucien often misspelled words in titles "Roffys" was one. Another was "Crockhurst" Lane instead of Crockers – unless of course it then had that name. Does anyone know? In a letter to his daughter Orovida (also an active

artist) while painting “Wild Hyacinths, Coldharbour” he wrote “it was a beautiful day – but unfortunately the *bracon* are making such rapid progress that they simply swamp the blue bells”. Some things don’t change!
