### THE 175th ANNIVERSARY OF CHRIST

**CHURCH** 

In the 1840s a programme of building churches was initiated to service the growing needs of villages around Dorking. Christ Church was part of this programme with land donated by the 13<sup>th</sup> Duke of Norfolk and construction funded by local merchant banker, John Labouchere. The Anniversary of the event was celebrated over the weekend of 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> October 2023.



#### The Anniversary recital

**Imagine** it is October 1848 Coldharbour and it's the dav of the dedication of the newly finished Christ Church. A new house stands in the evening shadow of the Church and those that live in house that are impressed. having watched the Church rise up as the masons placed stone upon stone in neat rows.



October 21<sup>st</sup> and 175

years later; my wife and I (Peter and Gaye), who now live in that same house, were in the Church to listen to the wonderful organ and song recital by Philip Drew, David Hansell and Jenny Hansell to celebrate the dedication. Philip and David made our pretty Rothwell Organ sound like the one at Westminster Abbey. Their fingers (and toes) flew up and down the ivories.

Jenny sang. Perfectly. Her soprano voice rang through the Sanctuary, soared through the Nave and out into the storm, where the rain stopped to listen. If you weren't there you missed a treat!

#### The Church Service

The next day members from across the Benefice gathered to celebrate. The service was led by Rev'd Kia Pakenham and supported by Rev'd Virginia Smith.




A highlight was a new hymn, a collaboration between Rev'd Virginia Smith and David Hansell, which included the line "Oh wonder, oh glory! We gaze out from Leith Hill" reminding us of the tranquil beauty surrounding our church.

Music featured highly and the congregation were welcomed with music on arrival. The Coldharbour Band, conducted by Debby Chapman, and the Leith Hill Choir, whose voices soared throughout the church, under the leadership of choirmaster and organist David Hansell, gave a wonderful performance. Debby rose to the conducting challenge, somehow keeping the band, the choir and David together – no mean feat from the balcony at the back of the church!

Readings were provided by Tim Brill and Penny Hopper and the intercessions were led by Francis Cave. Rev'd Virginia Smith took us back 175 years pondering on what the original worshippers would have thought about today's services held at Christ Church-with possibly the most shocking aspect being the ordination of women.

#### Latest news on the Volunteer Pub

The application to transform the site into houses and holiday let pods was rejected at the Mole Valley planning meeting held on 1<sup>st</sup> Nov by 8votes to 6. The grounds for refusal were: The proposal did not satisfy the requirements of the community as what was being taken away was not adequately replaced in the proposal; In an AONB the size of the proposed development +41% is unacceptable, the pods are out of keeping; The viability of the pub before closure was not determined so the statements about viability in the proposal are suspect. Paul Cleaver, who has led the fight to keep the 16<sup>th</sup> century building as a traditional pub, thanked everyone who attended the meeting and said 'the fight goes on!

### Clive and Emilie Williams completed the SAHARA challenge on behalf of Alzheimer's Society UK:

From 1 to 5 November 2023 my eldest daughter, Emilie, who lives in Dorking and I (Clive Williams of Abinger Common) completed a diverse and demanding trek across the Sahara Desert. We experienced 34-degree heat and trekked 50k (31 miles) over 3-days walking in the desert. We camped overnight in

small tents and ate local food to keep us going, plus 2-3 litres of water each day. On the way home we were lucky enough to stop in Marrakesh for lunch and to visit the souks. Apart from enjoyable being an adventure it has been very worthwhile, as we have currently raised £4,270 for Alzheimer's Society (UK). We thank many of you who have already contributed. This amazing cause is transforming the landscape of dementia forever and until a cure is

Another party – lunch at The Parrot – is also scheduled for members and their partners on 11<sup>th</sup> December.



#### Dear Friends.

Graham Mytton continues to sell stamps at a discount, especially for your Christmas mail. As you probably know, Royal Mail has made some old stamps invalid for postage. But Graham does not sell those. All his stamps are special



Second class mail up to 100g now costs 75p. Graham can supply stamps to make that value but at a discount of between 12 and 25 percent. Overseas mail costs £2.20 up to 100g. The same discounts apply here also. By the way, there is no need to pay for 1st class. All your mail automatically goes 1st class when you use stamps from Graham for reasons that he can explain if you really want to know. Send him your orders. He will also deliver. Church. We gave our thanks for all who work so hard throughout the world to provide us with the food we all eat to nourish our bodies. We are indeed blessed to have Tim hosting us and to share the sense of belonging and togetherness which warms the soul. Please see what all of our children have been learning in class this term. Mrs Jacky Fyson

Bees class have been exploring the idea of microhabitats at Forest School. They found that different minibeasts liked different conditions. 'The worms like it dark and cold but the woodlice like it dry and crumbly'. Butterflies enjoyed mapping out our school and playground in geography. They spent a lovely sunny afternoon drawing maps with chalk on the playground. They used a compass to find out where north was and added this to the map. Hedgehogs have been building castles in DT, thinking about the different parts and their importance. Each child made their own 3D castle. Rabbits thoroughly enjoyed the Rainforest topic. They created music, thinking about the sounds and noises they could hear from the animals and weather in the rainforest, and they made batik artwork based on the colours and patterns of the rainforest. #### SALV gets to the heart of the matter ...

Despite a filthy autumnal night as Storm Babet began to move across Britain,



around 100 friends and supporters of the **S**here **A**nd **L**ocal **Vil**lages (SALV) Health Trust packed into Shere Village Hall on October 18<sup>th</sup> to hear a fascinating talk by consultant cardiologist Dr Mike Hickman entitled *Look After Your Heart*.

Chairman Adrian O'Loughlin reported on the year up to March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2023.

Plans for the much-needed extension, the Graham Tyrrell Wing, had made some progress but were currently bogged down in NHS bureaucracy. Two new SALV Trustees – Jo Kelly and Sarah Ingram were welcomed and our new

Treasurer, Sue Edwards, gave her first report since taking over the role from her late father Terry.

Felix Shetty, the 18 year old son of Dr Emma Watts, presented his research on why there had been reluctance among some local patients to use Brenda the Vendor, the Dispensary's prescription vending machine. Felix told us that the oldest user was aged 99 and, very much on the positive side, "Brenda is now a proper part of the community!"

Dr Hickman, a fluent and informative speaker, told us of the many exciting developments in cardiac treatment over the ten years since he had last addressed SALV. Heart disease was still well at the top of the list of global mortality but the host of new drugs in the cardiac field, and in weight loss drugs, was "absolutely amazing". – However, the drugs are hugely expensive causing a moral dilemma for society and the NHS – "we have to work out who can have them" considering their high cost.

Over time, these new advances will make a major improvement in cardiovascular treatment – and Dr Hickman predicted that still more important developments will come in the next ten years.





# The Diary of a Shepherdess (learning on the job)

As we approach the end of 2023, I am writing my final article for the Parish News, the end of living in the Parish of Coldharbour and the end of shepherdessing here. The Spouse and I are preparing to move to a small farm that we have bought on the Forest Green / Walliswood border! And, of course, we will be taking the sheep with us!

Only a foolish shepherdess ill-prepares for their expectant flock! So, in May we started preparing their new grazing on our little farm. We toiled away all summer clearing fields which haven't been touched in over 20 years - while some people may refer to this as 'rewilding' I just noticed abandonment! We thrashed away through huge tangles of thick brambles and thistles, the tractor pulled out many metres of old wire fencing that had grown back into



the sheep love to pick through!

the earth and could risk hurting the sheep or other wildlife. We felled several Ash trees with Die-Back (which we send to our mill to be planked into floorboards for the house) and then split the remainder for firewood. The Spouse ordered and patiently waited for chestnut fencing posts coppiced from nearby woodland. The land has been harrowed and rolled and we have started to plant fruit trees such as apple and plum, that Pasture land is like property, it requires constant maintenance - not fertilizing like for an arable crop, but working with the land - cutting back the tree branches that block the sunlight, aerating the earth and spreading the muck for the dung beetles to then turn around and enrich our soil, sowing a diversity of grass seeds, encouraging pollinators and using good local hardwood chestnut fencing which will outlive us (as opposed to pine posts which probably won't make the next general election).



The barns are now up and running and took our first hay crop. We now also have somewhere for the sheep to come into - a huge barn for shelter, winter mud really takes its toll on their feet so this is somewhere for them to come in and dry out and rest their feet.

It's not all wildflowers and bucolic England pastures -we are already seeing the land soaked with rain, the ditches needing clearing to prevent fields flooding and the mud is building up. And, as we know, the work never stops with sheep, but the winter makes

it tougher.

Some people dream of a boat, or early retirement, or travels around the world - but for us it's always been owning our own land and the joy of improving it (fencing other people's fields is a laborious task that we have done for ten years ... but now!..). We have the sheer delight of opening our curtains to see our thriving flock, in their well-tended fields, and that to us is what it's all about. Thank you for reading about my beautiful flock this year! Farewell for now!

#### **The Abinger Pond**

If you have passed by St James' or the Abinger Hatch recently, you may have noticed the sorry state of the so-called pond by the road-side. It's been a while since it was last cleaned out, so Abinger Parish Council (APC) set about a cleanup. Three members of the north ward of the parish (Eliza, Paul, Phil) started to pull out surplus rushes from the pond (leaving such next to the pond to rot down and to allow any wildlife to climb back into the water) and to cut down brambles and stray saplings by the railings so we



can now see the pond clearly. In the process we liberated a bottle, a can and three dogs' balls (the rubber variety). The APC will continue beautification of the pond over the winter and ensure a more regular maintenance regime. *PhilipRawlings* 

### **Robin's Gardening Tips**



Well, December is here! Forecasters say we could have a white Christmas, we wait to see - but cold weather is already here. A time for all gardeners to take



stock and plan the planting for next year while sitting in the warm.

If not already done, apple and pear trees need pruning when there are no heavy frosts. Never plum or stone fruit trees though - pruning of those should be done in the summer.

Broad bean seeds sown now, in a mouse proof area, will bring on plants that will be ready to plant out in early spring. If the ground is

workable and not either frozen or a mud bath, some varieties can still be sown in the ground if given cloche protection.

If you have packets of seeds which are out of their suggested date, it is a good idea to test viability by putting a few seeds on some damp lint and checking for germination. No germination, no point in sowing.

As Christmas approaches, we deck the halls with holly, ivy and mistletoe, but did you know that mistletoe should be cut with a silver knife!? Also, that mistletoe was once hung in every hall all the year round as a sign that guests greeted under it were safe in that house. A recognition from Druidic times of its powers to ensure peace and friendship.

#### LOCAL HERITAGE AND HISTORY

#### December 1892 Cold Warbour Parish Magazine

The Reverend John Rooker is still residing in Brighton, his lengthy absence has been covered by four visiting ministers. His and his family's health must have been improved by the sea air however, especially in Bournemouth, in February.

"The villagers will be glad to learn that on Monday November 21st, a daughter was born to Mrs Rooker, the Vicar's wife."

In this final magazine of 1892, Henry Malden continues his extensive history of the Wealden Ironworks, which, in the 1700s, had contracts with the government to supply small iron guns to the fleet. But "....the vice of smuggling was so deeply rooted in the southern counties, the French paid good prices for the guns, and during our wars with France, the enemies of the country were secretly supplied with Sussex iron guns. The government found it out and transferred their contract to the Carron iron-works in Scotland....and our industry flickered a few years, and expired in 1828, when the last furnace went out."

Henry does not mention any Christmas celebrations but covers the first Temperance Meeting of the season on Friday November 18th.

"The audience was not as large as could have been wished. Mr. Soley, the Marylebone stonemason, strongly advocated the cause of total abstinence....It is hoped that results will shew his visit was not in vain."

The Victorian gentry had had a great impact locally as well as nationally. Much of the land and properties in Coldharbour, had been obtained from the Duke of Norfolk, whose forebears go back to the Conquest and owned huge tracts of England.

Charles Darwin's studies of earthworms at Leith Hill Place was instrumental in his work on natural selection, which makes his marriage to his first cousin, Emma Wedgewood, rather surprising. It is also surprising that a man, who suffered from seasickness, endured a five-year-return sea voyage to the Galapagos Islands in pursuit of his studies.

Darwin's best friend, John Hooker, the most important botanist of the century was a renowned traveller and plant collector, and the Director of Kew Gardens. Plants which include hookeri and hookeriana in their names are named in his honour. Most of the rhododendrons in English gardens were grown from seeds he collected in Tibet.

Hooker helped Darwin's sister, Caroline Wedgewood, create the magnificent avenue of species trees and rhododendrons that flanked the, then private

road leading to her home, Leith Hill Place and the Rhododendron Gardens.

The photo is of Nellie Jelly's mother who collected the tolls at the gate at the start of Mosses Wood. Nellie is the babe-in-arms and they lived in Rowemount Cottage. Some villagers might remember her and her brother Norman tootling through Coldharbour in their 3-wheeler Robin Reliant.



The Great War's harvest of "the brightest and the best" effectively ended the aristocratic era. Ockley Village Hall was gifted by the Lee-Steeres, lords of the manor of Ockley since 1784, in memory of the toll on their family.

Cuthbert Heath, a great recruiter for the war, offered his home, Anstie Grange, as a hospital for officers. It was used again in the Second World War by the military, and the family never returned. Cuthbert donated 200 acres of Leith Hill to the National Trust in 1929.

#### Why is Donkey Lane, Abinger, so called?

Terry O'Kelly wrote this in The Villages of Abinger Common and Wotton: Snippets of History compiled by Terence O'Kelly (1988): "The Rector's wife [Thomas Prince Hill, Rector Abinger 1877-1916] had a single-seat cart with bells on it, drawn by a donkey. As children we had to curtsey to Mrs. Hill, but sometimes when we heard the bells coming, we avoided this by hiding behind the hedge! (The donkey lived in the field where the rectory [now 'Moorcroft'] stands, and the path

from the school to Chandlers was known as Donkey Lane. In this name later became transferred to Rectory Lane, but my

For some reason this name later became transferred to Rectory Lane, but my mother always used the name for the footpath through Ellix Wood)". Terry O'Kelly lived in 'Mullacash', by the bowling green, and was a valued local historian; his grandfather built and lived in Skelmorlie (now Glebe Gate, our house).
