ABINGER COMMON & WOTTON W.I.

Our December meeting was a crafty one: Val Belam was our guide in Christmas cracker making.



Components needed: a cardboard tube with a hole, Christmas paper round it, a yoghurt pot sunk in the hole, filled with either Christmas decorations or sweets, et voila! Though that wasn't as easy as it sounds. Everyone was busily at work and tables were littered with greenery and sparkly decorations. So, both nimble fingers and double-sided Sellotape were much in demand.

Before enjoying a splendid festive tea prepared by the committee, the results were laid out on a table and the makers gathered behind it and sang "We wish you a Merry Christmas." There was another celebratory get-together before Christmas – a very good Christmas lunch at "The Parrot", which was a great success.

In January it was back down to earth. First, we voted for one of four proposed resolutions to help decide which one would be taken up nationally by the WI. The one which carried the day for us was about addressing the impacts of poor housing conditions. Then Helen Esplen, a Gomshall based physiotherapist and Pilates instructor, took us in hand and directed us in sitting and standing exercises that we could, and should, do to improve our balance and flexibility and to strengthen our arms and legs. She suggested that we might better remember to do these exercises if they were combined with a regular activity. For example, standing on one leg while cleaning our teeth (!) or sideways walking while working at a kitchen surface. She added that, when sitting, we should not cross our legs, and our hips should be higher than our knees. She also demonstrated other exercises that we could do when lying down or kneeling on all fours - but did not expect us to litter the hall floor by joining in on these!

Helen emphasised the value of keeping moving: walking, cycling, and swimming. She doesn't really like people installing lifts in their homes unless they absolutely must as it is so much better for us to walk upstairs. She quite often prefaced her advice with "When we get older...." which resonated with quite a number of our members!

After all this healthy advice, we enjoyed a wholesome and tasty tea prepared by Jane White, Sheila Sturge and Jan Hunt.



THE GREAT OUTDOORS

ROBIN'S GARDENING TIPS

As I write this, the ground is frozen hard, and all good gardeners are tucked up inside with a seed catalogue.

Walking on frozen grass can actually damage it. But the time is now right to sow onion seeds, tomatoes,

melons, and sweet peas.

Apart from the sweet peas a degree of warmth is necessary for seeds to germinate, a windowsill is ideal. Sweet pea seeds, sown 5 seeds to a pot do need to be kept frost and mouse free, but grown cold will produce strong plants for planting out later in spring.



There is still time to prune apple and pear trees, also if you have them, grape vines. Roses can be left till later but do make sure they are still firmly in the ground as the frost may have caused them to become loose.

Don't be in too much hurry to tidy up borders, old growth does provide some protection to not only new shoots but also wildlife. However, despite climate change, when you do get round to tidying, diseased matter should be burnt not composted.

If you have established rhubarb plants (over 3 years

old), why not cover one with an old bucket, or better still a clay rhubarb pot if you are lucky enough to have one, and enjoy young stems of pink, sweet, forced rhubarb in a few weeks.

Allow bulbs like hyacinths, which have flowered indoors to die down naturally and once the soil is frost

free plant them in the garden.

As I suggested last time, if you have partial packets of seeds from last year do test their viability before wasting time and energy planting them if they are unlikely to germinate.

Gardening can be very rewarding but also back breaking!

Belted Galloway cattle have been introduced to Abinger Roughs for the first time since the late 19th century. Grazing cattle do a wonderful job of maintaining and improving grassland biodiversity and soil habitats. Safety is a high priority, and the cattle are monitored for their calmness and behaviour around walkers. When around livestock, please keep your dog on a lead and under close control and close the gates behind you.

CONSERVATION WORK ON LEITH HILL

Throughout January and February extensive woodland conservation work is taking place in Dingwall Wood on Leith Hill. The National Trust say that the woodland needs thinning to allow more light in to the understory.

A diverse wood is more resilient, and more light will encourage tree diversity, different species of flora, fauna, funghi and invertebrates.

It may look untidy for a while, but all footpaths

will remain open. Please be extra careful when using the orange and purple waymarked routes and footpaths through the area and it would be advisable to keep dogs on leads while the work goes on.

Our Covid vaccination programme continues to be enthusiastically delivered by our superb nurse team. If you are eligible, but not yet vaccinated, do book in to one of our clinics. If you think you could be eligible but haven't received a text or call from us do make contact and we can check for you. In January we welcomed three new doctors in training from the RSCH: Dr Meera Patel who was with us earlier this year and has just completed a post in the Community Mental Health &Recovery Service; Dr Madhavi Berks from A&E; and Dr Sonum Bathia from Paediatrics. They join Dr Alex Argent and Dr Elly Balme, so altogether we have

a wonderful group of young enthusiastic and knowledgeable doctors to complement our team.

Prompted by November's Remembrance Sunday we have become an Armed Forces veteran friendly GP practice. The NHS has a duty to deliver on a number of health commitments in relation to the Armed Forces community (serving personnel (regulars and reservists), veterans and their families), which are set out in the Armed Forces Covenant and the NHS Constitution. Specifically, they are responsible for commissioning bespoke mental and physical health services for veterans, including Op COURAGE: The Veterans Mental Health and Wellbeing Service and The Veterans Trauma Network. Look out for information on our website and in our waiting room. We'd love you to come forward and let us know if you are an Armed Forces veteran and we will ensure this is recognised and documented in your notes.

Emma has previously highlighted the rural inequity of the GP Recovery Plan which pledged £645 million to pharmacists to do consultations on behalf of GPs, excluding dispensing doctors from the scheme. Given 18% of the UK population are rural and attached to dispensing practices this is a significant equity gap.
