It is also a great time to celebrate our

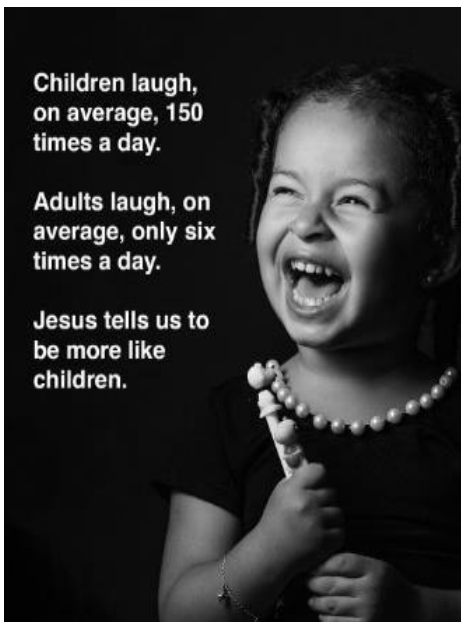
fabulous communities in Coldharbour and Abinger!

Dedication Festival Weekend at St James' – May 11th & 12th

Four Seasons – But No Vivaldi!

A church's Dedication Festival is when we celebrate the fact of its existence, (as opposed to the Patronal Festival when we celebrate the life and work of its patron saint). Ideally, this takes place on the anniversary of the dedication, but, although we know that St James' became so-dedicated in the 13th century we have no idea exactly when. However, we do know that the church was re-dedicated after the post-war repairs on May 12th (1951). As it happens that date in 2024 is a Sunday, and Choral Evensong will have a distinctly celebratory flavour!

But, as in the last two years, we'll make a weekend of it, with concerts the day before. This year they will be vocal, rather than an organ recital, and feature what is quite possibly the best music you don't (yet) know by a composer who has been a recurring and often defining element in my life.

In 1967 the choir of King's College, Cambridge recorded the Mass for Christmas Eve (*Messe de Minuit*) by Marc-Antoine Charpentier (c1640-1704), a charming work based on French carol melodies and which some of you may have sung in your various choral societies. This introduced the work and its composer to the wide circle of that choir's admirers and inspired the Head of Music at a school in Berkshire to tackle it with his school choir. A promising A-level Music pupil was asked to play the harpsichord part and suddenly a career-path opened up...

As it happened, my next decade was concerned more with German music but, further inspired by other performing ensembles, in the 1980s Jenny and I became part of a group which was rapidly rescuing many other works by M-AC from their lingering deaths on library shelves. 'Why?' is a reasonable question. 'Because it's absolutely wonderful' is the answer! Cutting what could become a very long story short, our favourite is undoubtedly his 'Four Seasons of the Year' – or, more simply, just 'The Seasons'.

Unlike those of Vivaldi (or, indeed, Tchaikovsky), Charpentier's Seasons are vocal duets with keyboard support. The words are from the Song of Songs and the first performers were the Cistercian nuns of the Abbaye-aux-Bois in 1685. The musical lines are consistently tuneful, the inter-weaving of the voices positively voluptuous, and, especially given the small number of performers, the harmony often rich and scrunchy. This is music Jenny and I have performed often, with a variety of third parties. We've always looked

forward to it. We've always enjoyed it. Now you can find out why, and share our secret!

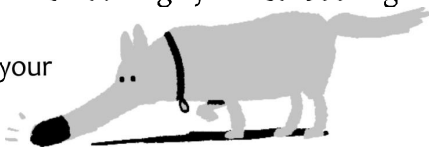
‘Dogs Trust’ Charity

Local Bus Updates

Change to Coldharbour Bus Service

Buses4U, which runs timetabled buses 50 and 433 between Coldharbour, Dorking, Horsham, Reigate and Redhill, published a new timetable on 1st April. The daily 5.15 pm service back to Coldharbour from Dorking has been scrapped. On some days if you get the scheduled bus down to Dorking there is no scheduled service back. The alternative is to book a ride on Surrey Connect's 'Mole Valley Digital Demand Responsive Transport' bus (tel. no: 0300 123 7751; www.surreyconnect.org.uk for more information). Is there one? **Yes!!** The number 22 - operated by Metrobus. You can find the timetable at <https://www.surreycc.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/buses-and-other-transport/bus-timetables>. The bus goes to Dorking and beyond to Gatwick even (which may be of interest...has anyone tried it?) four times a day (currently 10.43, 12.43, 14.43 and 17.45) during the week. On first sight it looks as though there is no bus coming back, but in fact (as

Hazel Watson has assured me) you take the bus from Gatwick or Dorking to Abinger Hammer, remain on it and it does a loop via Holmbury bringing you back to the Friday Street turn at said times. Not immediately obvious but... Alternatives are the Connect Bus, as mentioned by Mary above, or the number 32 running along the A25 if you are fit enough to get down there (or if you are lucky enough to have a car, park at Wotton).

Abinger Tennis Club is keen to grow and promote the use of the courts by all ages and abilities.



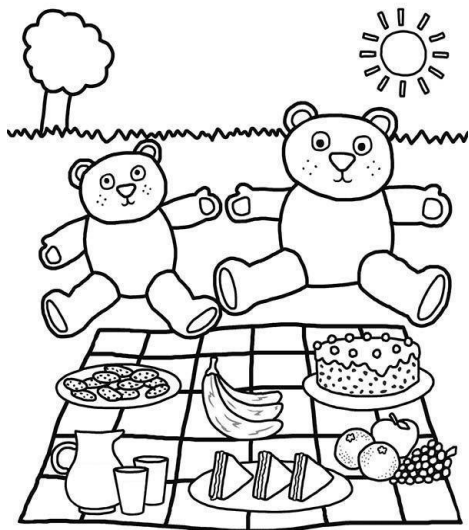

The Teddy Bears Picnic

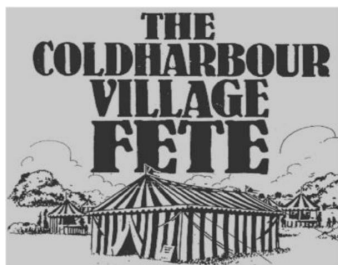

John Kerry

Many people in Abinger will have known John Kerry who died very suddenly at the end of March. He and Belinda moved to Abinger Common from Holmbury in 1982 and they made many friends here. Belinda was a teacher at the school and also a Sunday School teacher. In 1994 they moved to Ockley to have more space and a larger garden and then a year ago moved

again to Godalming to be close to their daughter Tessie. 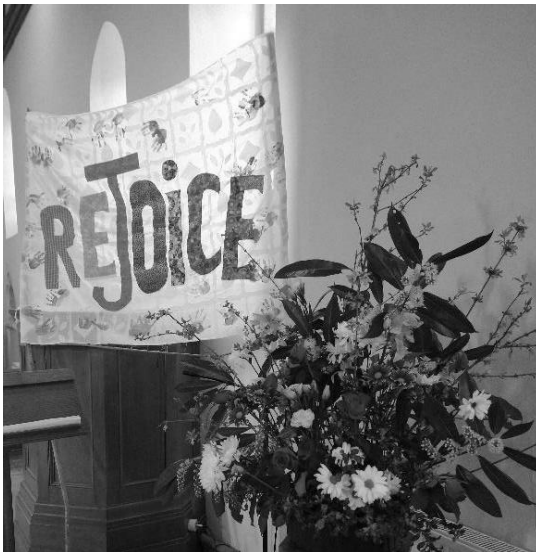

The Team Leaders at Amber have really supported me.”

Martin’s goal is to work in politics or with prison reform, as well as live a healthy lifestyle. “Amber has given me a positive outlook on life. The structure is good and the routine helped put my life back on track.”

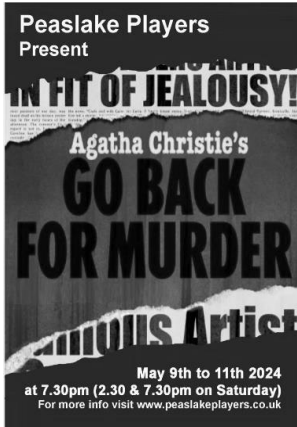

Book now for films in May and June 2024

can also buy tickets from the shops: Crumbs and/or the Surrey Hills Beer & Gin Company in Shere. All tickets, except where indicated, cost £5/adult and £3.50/child. All films start at 7.30 pm.

Friday 3rd May – *The Color Purple* – is a story of love and resilience based on Alice Walker's 1982 novel, and the 2005 Broadway musical. The story centres round the life of Celie, as she goes from a girl in 1909 through the 1940s in a racist US South, with the horrors of incest, cruelty and domestic abuse. However, this musical version sugars the pill and softens the blow, and takes away some of the shock of violence and tragedy of the novel, and tilts the experience more towards female solidarity and triumph over adversity. It harnesses a smart blend of gospel and blues, big band, jazz, and even tap-dancing showtunes to lift the characters, and the audience, to their feet. It's a "say amen, everybody" approach. 'The musical film version of *The Color Purple* stands on its own as a vibrant, uplifting experience, and the singing and dancing are superb.' Classification PG - 13 (Running time is 2 hours 21 minutes).

Sunday 19th May – Rye Lane - This is a sunny romantic comedy that starts out on the streets of South East London, where twentysomethings Yas (Oparah) and Dom (Jonsson) meet for the first time in an Art gallery. Over the course of a day, they bond over their failed past relationships, and settle scores with their respective exes. Could a new romance be just around the corner? It's a warm, fun, instantly likeable story, centred around two charismatic young leads in Oparah and Jonsson. They are joined by an almost entirely Black British cast (with Colin Firth in a cameo role). *Rye Lane* will leave you with a smile on your face and a spring in your step, and (hopefully) a renewed confidence in the next-wave British film-making. Classification 15 (Running time is 1 hour 22 minutes).

Thursday 6th June – Zone of Interest – is a film loosely based on Martin Amis' novel of the same name but inspired by the director (Jonathan Glazer's) visit to Auschwitz, where he noticed that Hess' house was so close to the death camp, that it shared a wall. "Shot in a low-key, fly on the wall style, the drama (in German with English sub-titles) unfolds in the meticulously run house and well-tended garden, occupied by Rudolph Hess, the notorious commandant of Auschwitz, and his family. In the concentration camp, literally next door, and within earshot, all 'hell' is unfolding, but in the Hess household, it is very much suburban life as normal." Winner of the 2024 Oscars for Best International feature film, and Best Sound. "This is an 'unmissable' film, with much of its power coming from its meticulous sound design." However, this is a masterful and chilling film that can strike like a lightning bolt on first watch and stay with you for some time"! Classification PG -13 (Running time is 1 hour 45 minutes).

Sunday 16th June – Wonka - is based on the extraordinary character at the centre of *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, one of Roald Dahl's most iconic children's books. Timothée Chalamet is charm itself as the young Wonka who comes to pre-war Paris as a young man after a quaintly conceived life on the ocean wave, determined to make his fortune with the chocolate recipes invented by his mum (played by Sally Hawkins). He's a chocolate disruptor, shaking up the stagnant chocolate business with his new chocolatey ideas; he faces cruelty and imprisonment but wins out with the help of new friends. It also stars Hugh Grant as an Oompah Lumpah, as well as Olivia Coleman and Rowan Atkinson. 'Wonka is a funny heart-warming musical that dances its way through some unexpectedly dark themes, and excels in its wildly inventive musical set pieces'. It dreams up a new origin story for a classic character. Classification PG (Running time is 1 hour 56 minutes).

The highlight of the month will undoubtedly be the final concert of the season for the Dorking Concertgoers – a recital by Sheku and Isata Kanneh-Mason, the distinguished cellist and pianist. Brother and sister Sheku and Isata come from an extraordinary musical family which has been much in the news and they need no introduction. Their programme is an ambitious one, comprising four major cello sonatas by Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Chopin and Fauré. Perhaps not surprisingly, this concert was sold out long ago.

Fauré's *Pavane*, followed by Mozart's lovely clarinet concerto with Andrew Meredith as the soloist. The Surrey Philharmonic Orchestra, playing in Ashted, opens its programme with Wagner's *Siegfried Idyll*, a lovely short work using themes from his opera *Siegfried* and written as a birthday greeting for his wife. Then comes Richard Strauss's first horn concerto, a brilliant and virtuosic early work, and the concert finishes with Gounod's first symphony, rarely heard but a delightful piece.

The Dorking Halls has two screenings of Bizet's opera *Carmen* from the Royal Opera House, the first being a live relay, and also a screening of a ballet, *The Winter's Tale*, from the Royal Ballet with music by Joby Talbot.

GARDENS

Robin's Gardening Tips for May



Hopefully the weather is now improving and the ground drying out enough to work. There is still time to sow many vegetable seeds, without them rotting off due to the wet.

Many old garden planting traditions are still relevant and have been proven to work. Tomatoes and potatoes should not be planted near each other as they can increase the chance of blight. Beans and onions hate each other and do not grow well together. Strawberries hate cabbage, beans also hate gladioli! To guard against carrot and onion flies these are best planted in alternate rows. Marigolds planted in the vegetable garden can help reduce the occurrence of black fly. The list can go on - like people, plants have likes and dislikes of others!

While we should get no frosts now, we could get them up to the first week of June this year (there is a new moon in the first week), so hanging baskets could, with caution, be safe to put out. Don't forget to check daily for watering, especially if it has been windy.

Once sweet peas start flowering do pick daily and enjoy the scent indoors. Remove spent flowers from the plants as soon as possible so seed is not set, therefore keeping the flowers going for a lot longer.

Don't forget, should you want a plant bargain a good selection will be available at the Coldharbour Fete at reasonable prices, and if you have grown more than you need why not donate them to the plant stall, I am sure they will be gratefully received.

ABINGER COMMON & WOTTON W.I.

Our chairman, Lesley, welcomed us all to the meeting and recommended that members took time to look at the WI Learning Hub which presents a variety of live on-line courses. Following this Avril reported on the recent WI Annual Surrey Federation meeting that had been held at the Dorking Halls and that she had found very interesting. Two speakers had talked about the help their Guide Dogs had given them, and another speaker was a Body Language Expert whose talk included many references to people in public life.

We then welcomed our speaker, Michael Miller, a resident of Cranleigh, who many years ago started to make a collection of early postcard views of his village and the surrounding countryside. For our talk he had made up a slide collection of the best views covering our local area - "A postcard view of the Tillingbourne Valley". Four tributaries that join up to form the Tillingbourne were illustrated along with the series of water mills that were constructed to serve the former industrial nature of the area. One showed Gomshall Mill where Fullers Earth had been used to wash the lanolin out of wool. A postcard of Shere showed a German gun by the Tillingbourne, put there as a trophy of war, though it didn't stay there long as people didn't want to be reminded of it all. It was fascinating to see familiar views as seen by photographers in the early 20th Century – some remarkably unchanged over 100 years later. Thank you to our tea hostesses, Sally, Dena and Hermie.

LOCAL HERITAGE AND HISTORY

From The Abinger Monthly Record, June 1893

Jean Ridgers had some interesting documents in her possession that are now being passed on to the Dorking Museum. These include a few old Abinger Monthly Records, and what follows is all from the Abinger Notes of the June 1893 edition. One striking thing is the number of arguments and disputes there were at the time. It makes our complaints about potholes, speeding etc. look extremely mild in comparison! Who on earth were the Abinger Cat-callers?

“The Abinger Cat-callers, not content with having their own way in parish matters, continue bitterly to complain of their exposure in the AMR. They plaintively lament our wickedness in replying to their foul and unprovoked attacks.”

Re the Easter distribution of bread provided by the ‘Abinger Charities’: “We do not understand why a loaf was refused to the sick son of George Charman... It is true that the rector has not called at Charman’s cottage for two years, but this private difference is no reason for the refusal of the loaf.”

There is the alleged pollution of the Tillingbourne: “Abinger is agitated by a great controversy between Sir Thomas Farrer, Bart., and Mr John Coe, on the subject of the alleged pollution of the Tillingbourne.”

And the concept of ‘woke’ was clearly a long way in the future: “On Monday evening May 8, a most successful entertainment was given at the Abinger Hammer Schoolroom, the first part of which consisted of a concert, and the latter of a “Nigger Farce”... The proceeds, amounting to £1 17s, were given to the Gomshall Improvement Society”

Then there was an awful court case concerning the ill treatment of 15 heifers who were turned on to Abinger Common to graze. Sadly there wasn’t enough food for them and they became emaciated with one dying of starvation. You will be pleased to hear that there was a conviction.

However, it was not all bad! This was the year the Well was constructed: “This well is being constructed by Mr. Evelyn, as lord of the manor, for the use of Abinger parishioners and neighbours. It is 150 feet deep and yields an abundant supply”.

And finally the Abinger Hatch: “We are pleased to hear that under the management of Mr. George Mitchell this pleasant sample of an English wayside inn is likely to retain the high reputation which it had in the time of the late respected landlord Mr. Philip Muggeridge.”
