#### **NEWS AND UPDATES**

#### **Hollow Lane drain**

Back in 2019, Surrey County Council installed a fancy pipe to carry away rain water that floods down from Leith Hill into Hollow Lane, and to send it towards Friday Street and to a soak-away in the woods. As you have probably noticed, this failed the first time it rained, scattering the packing gravel and blocking the pipe. SCC have struggled since to find a solution.

We (Abinger Parish Council and neighbours) met recently with Hazel Watson (our SCC councillor) and with Highway's maintenance and engineers, to discuss progress. At last, it seems, a plan is emerging. The design is yet to be finalised and approved but Phase I will involve a shored-up ditch to protect road and ditch – the ditch will need regular clearing that SCC have committed to. Unfortunately, there are many restrictions as to what is allowed involving tree protection and much else.

SCC hope to fit the this works in financial year. Phase involves extending the runaway area onto Abinger Common; all sorts of permissions are needed to get this completed. We are hopeful that we will soon see the last of torrents hurtling



down towards Friday Street.

# Update on Repairs to the Millennium Path in Coldharbour

Last month Graham Mytton reported that "The Millennium Path" in Coldharbour, or "The Board Walk" that goes between the northern end of the Memorial Ground, just by the swings and reaches the southern side of Roffeys, has been closed because the boards have rotted and need replacing.

Now Stuart MacLachlan reports "As always there are very differing opinions but the majority of people are in favour of removing the boardwalk and doing

some work on the underlying footpath so that people with children's buggies can still have easier access to the memorial ground and playground opposite the church.

The National Trust are in agreement with this proposal and have suggested that the wet eastern end of the footpath be worked on so that it can dry out. This could include diverting any springs, removing undergrowth and pollarding of trees. They are now considering this proposal and I believe that the parish council will pay for most, if not all, of it."

#### **Abinger Padel**

Thank you to all who have supported our application to build 2 Padel courts on the top carpark by the tennis courts. The application went to appeal. We have currently withdrawn this appeal as we felt there was a high risk of it being rejected again. We will be putting in a new stronger application addressing the issues the planners had more thoroughly.

We hope they take into account the support that has already been sent, otherwise we will

Hello, my name is Elwyn Perry and I've lived in

Coldharbour for nearly 25 years. I used to run meditation classes from a room at the top of my house, so some of you will know me from that, but switched to running them online during lockdown and stopped a couple of years ago when my mum died and I was grieving.

Recently a friend approached me and asked if I'd run some in person again and I realised how much I've missed the classes. My classes are very simple, you get a chance to learn to use your breath and focus in simple ways to go inside and connect with parts of your body and rest your attention in your heart or inner eye. I promise the atmosphere will be friendly and loving, with time and space to ask questions and even share your experience if you want to (You absolutely don't have to). There's something special about being with like-minded people in a safe loving space that helps us all access the peace and love we have inside ourselves. The aim of meditation is to help us bring forward the best parts of ourselves more of the time, so that we can be present and creative through the day, in any situation we find ourselves in.

Kia has kindly agreed that I can run them in the vestry at St James', though the form of meditation I will be teaching is not connected with any form of religion.

They will be on a **Thursday from 3-4pm** with breaks in between meditations to ask questions.

### Public talk: Explore the world of George Edmund Street, Mastermind of Victorian Gothic Revival

#### Sat 16 Nov 24, 1030 at St Mary's Church, Holmbury St Mary

Join us for a fascinating talk by Richard Peats, Principal Inspector at Historic England. Dive into the intricate world of 19th century church furnishings and architecture, as Richard explores Street's impact on Victorian design and restoration.

George Edmund Street was one of the most creative of Victorian architects who deserves to be better known. St Mary's was one of the last buildings he designed and one of the most personal, as it was conceived as a memorial to his second wife in the village where they had made their home. This talk will use St Mary's as a window into exploring Street's world: looking at how he worked, how he was trying to achieve a new sort of architecture for the Steam Age and how his deeply felt



Christian faith was central to his conception of his work as an architect.

Richard Peats joined Historic England 15 years ago after working for the National Trust, as conservation officer in Local Authorities and in the private sector and is currently a Principal Inspector of Historic Buildings and Areas. While with Historic England, he has researched George Edmund Street's work as a restorer and furnisher of churches. He is particularly interested in helping churches adapt to meet the needs of their congregations and the communities they serve while retaining their historic interest and architectural beauty. Richard Peats FSA MA IHBC is Principal Inspector of Historic Buildings and Areas at Historic England.

# Compassion Sunday 2024 - Can you help a child living in poverty?

At St James' in September, we were lucky enough to be joined by Doki Arach. Living in extreme poverty in Kampala, Uganda, Doki was sponsored through Compassion from the age of 10, and came to share her inspiring story with us.



Doki at that time was living in a small room with her father and twelve other siblings and cousins, having escaped from the horrific attacks that the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) were carrying out daily in villages across Doki's region in the north of Uganda. When her sister was abducted by the LRA, Doki's mother had no option but to follow them and try to rescue her daughter. Doki's father knew that staying in the village was too risky for the rest of the family, and they made the long journey to the country's capital city. Doki was six years old.

For several years, the family had no option but to work for almost nothing, surviving on food taken as payment and what they could find on the street. The church opposite their room was part of a Compassion project and while the priest there couldn't help straight away, he promised to let them know when more sponsorship was available for children. One day, Doki saw a queue forming outside the church, and thinking it was for food, joined it. In fact, it was a queue of children hoping to find a Compassion sponsor, and when Doki was chosen from that big group, her life started to change.

The sponsorship gave her a place at the church school, money for clothes, medical support and a weekly food parcel for the family. That Christmas she received her first ever Christmas present - it was a red vest. Just as valuable

to her were the letters she would receive from her sponsor, encouraging her, giving her hope and helping her to see that she could escape her desperate situation.

Having done well at school and gained a teaching degree, Doki now lives and works in the UK, mentoring college students with special needs and advocating for them as they look for support in their next stages of life.

Worldwide, 333 million children live in poverty, without access to education, health, housing, nutrition, sanitation or water.

Compassion UK asks us to make a difference by sponsoring a child, and across Abinger and Coldharbour, these are the 29 children who are already benefitting from their sponsor's love and support.



But of course we can always do more.

Together, our churches support Ronald in Uganda, and you can contribute to this by donating something towards his sponsorship (additional funds can be allocated to his family or the village project), or by becoming a letter-writing friend to him.

There are many others looking for sponsors right now, and you could make a life-changing difference to a child's future today. It costs £32 a month to empower a child in poverty with education, access to health care, protection from malnutrition and mentorship, and of course your letters are priceless to a child living in extreme need of encouragement and hope.

Thursday 3rd October – Anatomy of a Fall – a wife is on trial for the possible murder of her husband, who is found fallen from the highest window of their chalet in the French Alps. To fully understand a marriage, you need to be a part of it. And even then, it can seem as if the two partners are communicating in entirely different languages. This is literally the case in the marriage of successful German-born author Sandra (played by a phenomenal Sandra Hüller) and her French husband, aspiring writer Samuel (Samuel Theis), where Sandra prefers to speak in English, even though, at her husband's behest, they live in France. It is a French film which won the 2023 Palme d'Or, and its director, Justine Triet is only the third female director to achieve this prize. Classification R (not suitable for children under 14 because of its focus on complex adult relationships and violent themes) (Running time is 2 hours 32 minutes).

**Sunday 20th October – Brian and Charles** – is a very British film about an eccentric inventor and a ramshackle robot. Brian (David Earl) lives in a remote cottage in the Welsh valleys, where he spends his time developing mad-cap inventions. He puts together a quirky-looking robot, that he calls Charles. The film manages to make you believe that Charles is a sentient being. Brian thinks it's best to keep Charles a secret from the locals, and so the pair spend their days playing darts, cooking cabbages, riding bikes, having pillow fights and watching TV travel shows. The film is about loneliness and the power of friendship. It is really touching and yet has moments of slapstick comedy. 'Its mixture of sweetness and silliness is wonderful'. Classification PG (Running time is 1 hours 31 minutes).

Thursday 7th November – The Fall Guy – Ryan Gosling plays a stunt double who is recovering from an accident on set, when he lands a job on an action movie directed by his ex-girlfriend, Jodie (Emily Blunt). He is desperate to get back together with Jodie, but she wants to keep things 'profesh'. When the leading man (Aaron Taylor-Johnson) goes missing, Colt is sent to go and find him. The Fall Guy, is based on the 1980s American TV series, which starred Lee Majors. There are plenty of crazy stunts and palpable chemistry between the two stars. Classification 12A (Running time is 2 hours 6 minutes).

**Sunday 17th November – The Holdovers** - is a witty and heart-warming comedy set in an American academy in the 1970s over a Christmas break. Every holiday, a few children have to stay at school instead of going home, requiring lonely teacher, Paul Hunham (Paul Giomatti) to keep an eye on them. "The format may be unsurprising, but there is nothing unsurprising about just how good and entertaining this is", say critics. Classification R (not suitable for children under 14) (Running time is 2 hours 13 minutes).

# ABINGER COMMON & WOTTON W.I.

On a sunny August morning we met at Sally Frost's home for a coffee morning, a social gathering with a 'Bring and Buy' and a raffle - a fundraiser for the charity Dogs for the Hard of Hearing. Sally told us heart-warming stories of the benefit of the dogs, and later was delighted to report that donations collected during and after the event totalled the wonderful amount of £400.

Lesley welcomed us to the September afternoon meeting and introduced Myra who had come to tell us about our local Air Ambulance Charity – HEMS-KSS Helicopter Emergency Medical Service covering a population of 4.8 million in Kent, Surrey and Sussex. This organisation is an independent charity reliant on the generosity of their supporters, receiving no government funding, a position which enables it to operate without being bound down by



government restrictions. With a mission to save lives, and founded in 1989, the teams include a pilot and co-pilot, 2 medics, and a dispatch worker at base who remains in contact throughout the operations. They have 3 helicopters and 4 rapid response road vehicles which can reach any part of the area in under 30 minutes and they are on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. More recently they have acquired a remote-controlled drone that can take a defibrillator to an incident. It is not just the provision of a medical response as they are also involved in prevention education and community response and follow up with patient and family aftercare. A wonderful service that has been called to 3,200 emergency incidents in the last year. Of course, the cost is huge - £6.6 million per year – and we were encouraged to tell people about the service and help raise funds if possible.

Stage Right Juniors is for children aged 6 to 12 and we now have spaces. If your





Here's a memory that Cherry Clarke shared of how she appeared on the front of Tatler in 1963.

Cherry was engaged to be married to Robert Clarke of Abinger Manor in 1963.



She embraced tradition and for the Fair that June she was dressed very elegantly in a long red dress and flowing train (old curtains) topped off by wimple. She caught the attention of a photographer (later identified as Dick Swavne) and was photographed in the doorway of Abinger Manor.

Unbeknownst to her, the photographer was quite famous, having photographed Twiggy for Tatler, and he used this shot as a cover for Tatler the following Summer with an article inside entitled "a village goes medieval".

'Miss Cherry Wardby is

wearing her 14<sup>th</sup> century gown on the rose hung porch of the house she will soon enter as a bride'

Cherry only discovered that she was in Tatler when her father, who had come to the UK from Africa for her wedding, was handed the magazine in the waiting room at the dentist's! ### **Robin's Gardening Tips for October**

Well, the weather has certainly been topsy-turvy so far this autumn! If you have not already done so, why not take cuttings of fuchsias, geraniums and even petunias, ready for next spring and save yourselves money. Cuttings taken now, putting several in pots of compost mixed with perlite and overwintered in a frost free area will be ready to pot on in early spring.

It's a good idea to cut rose bushes back by about a third, and ensuring they are firmly in the ground to prevent wind rock in the winter. Don't discard the prunings but push them into the ground in a corner and forget about them for a year, you may be surprised and find several have rooted giving you new roses on their own rootstock.

Once the leaves have dropped start pruning fruit trees but do remember, not stone fruits, these need pruning in summer months, to prevent diseases taking hold.



If you have the space in, for example, a cold greenhouse, the traditional day to plant sweet peas is the 'double tenth' that is 10th of October. Mind you from my experience the mice know the date as well!

Autumn is an ideal time to plant new trees and shrubs. The ground is still warm and they will not need watering so much.

Smaller trees and plants take better than much larger ones and soon catch up. Conifers if you are planting them need a gallon of water per foot of tree per day!

As the evenings draw in and the temperature drops a bonus is the grass doesn't need cutting, at least not as often, so relax!
