

#### Frankie Burt 1950 - 2024

Frankie died unexpectedly on 7<sup>th</sup> December. Her funeral service was held at St James' on 16<sup>th</sup> January.

Frankie and Kevin raised their family in Abinger and had been residents of Abinger Common for over 40 years. Kevin died in December 2022. Frankie and Kevin threw themselves into village life and were involved with all that this wonderful community has to offer. Frankie will be greatly missed and mourned by all. Mary Cooper and her husband Basil came to live at Kitlands Court in Coldharbour about 45 years ago. Basil died in 2021. In her later years, two serious falls reduced Mary's mobility severely. But she always enjoyed seeing visitors and they also enjoyed seeing her and sharing the latest village gossip.

Mary was the youngest of four daughters. She grew up in Tyne and Wear and met Basil at a dance to which she had gone with an older sister. They married when Mary was 19 and not long afterwards Basil went to take a job in Malaya. Mary followed him on a cargo ship. The couple's two daughters, Adrienne and Alayne were born there.

Mary played tennis, was a keen gardener and made clothes for the girls. She has two granddaughters and two great grandchildren. She and Basil travelled a lot. After their long time in Malaya, Mary often went with Basil when he visited the several energy projects he ran in Asia, Africa, and the Caribbean.

Mary died on 16<sup>th</sup> Dec 2024. The funeral service for Mary was held in Christ Church on 21<sup>st</sup> January.

# Fundraising for the Amber Foundation with the Meadvale Singers at St James' Abinger

In early December the Meadvale Singers held a concert to raise money for the Amber Foundation, a charity that helps homeless young people get back on their feet. Louise Cheung, who works for the charity in Farm Place in Ockley, came along to the concert with Patrick.

Patrick has become quite a media star, having just featured in an article in *The Independent* about young people facing homelessness. He clearly touched people's hearts as we were able to send a magnificent £1020 to Amber! A year ago, 25 year old Patrick was sleeping in a field. He had nowhere else to go after fleeing an abusive ex-partner. After years spent sofa-surfing following a fallout with his parents over his drug use, (which saw him kicked



out of the family home), Patrick found himself with nowhere to turn. But he was fortunate. With the help of the Amber Foundation, he was quickly able to get back on his feet. He gave our concert audience the good news that he has just started a job with Thames Water and is about to move into shared accommodation with other young people in Sandhurst.

Patrick is one of 136,000 18- to 24-year-olds who faced homelessness in the past year, according to latest estimates.

**The Christmas party in Christ Church** was a great success and the talented Flying Giraffes played - two of the members live in the village. Everyone



brought food and a great time was had by all.

#### Graham Mytton's stamps sales topped £1,500.

The discount stamps for villagers' Christmas mail were again popular. This year's sales topped £1,500. Graham buys 100s of valid unused stamps, mainly from the legacies of deceased collectors, at a discount. He completely ran out of all that he had purchased for the year. But he still has a few hundred 1st class single stamps at a discount. Royal Mail's price for 1st Class is now £1.65 per posted item up to 100g weight. This kind of stamp is always worth the 1st class rate. And they cost you only £1.10 each.

# Help! Toads on the Roads Project. Toads are feeling amorous and looking for a love nest.

Every year around this time, we start to put in place the arrangements for the annual Toad Patrol under the auspices of Froglife's "Toads on Roads" project. Common Toads are very particular about where they breed and often migrate back to their ancestral breeding ponds each year.

#### There are numerous crossings nationwide, one is in Coldharbour Village.

Our aim is to raise the awareness of road-users to the presence of the toads



and to physically assist them to cross safely, by translocating them from the road surface or opposite verge or ditch, to the nearby pond.

We need volunteers who are willing to spend a couple of hours in the evening at Coldharbour once a week, locating the migrating amphibians and assisting them across to the

pond. Ideally volunteers work in pairs but individuals can work alone if they wish, with the appropriate lone working protocols in place. Further guidance in terms of the process and the risks and control measures associated with it, along with appropriate equipment, will be made available to those who wish to get involved.

If you think that you'd like to help these amazing creatures, please email me so we can get an idea of numbers. Also, if you could identify the likely day(s) that you might be available to help, that would assist in putting together a rota to cover the week. We normally manage the process through a WhatsApp group so please also confirm that you are happy to be part of that and provide your best contact number. ## Fundraising evening, 7pm Friday 28th Feb at St James'

After a wonderful visit from Peace last summer, Rosie McCance and I, Lucy Pakenham, decided to look into how we could go about volunteering with the Fountain of Peace Children's Foundation in Uganda.

Fountain of Peace is a charity which houses abandoned children in their



village. Each house has two women acting as parental figures and multiple children under their care. These houses act as a family unit rather than the children going into an institution such as an orphanage. The village has a school and church, with Christian principles being fundamental in the way the children are bought up.

As I planned my gap year for 2025, I realised this would be the perfect opportunity to lend a helping hand. Rosie shared my excitement and enthusiasm for the project, and we decided to plan the visit together. I reached out to the volunteer team at Fountain of Peace and after some inspiring conversations over Zoom, Rosie and I confirmed our plans to travel to Uganda for 10 days in April 2025. We discussed why we wanted to travel over and what sorts of things we would be able to help with. We decided our strengths were more pastoral than physical, as building was not one of our main strengths! We both agreed that we simply wanted to help in any way we could, with a main focus of meeting, talking to, and spending time with the women and children over there.

To help make our journey possible and support the Foundation's fantastic work, we invite you to join us for a fundraising evening on *Friday 28th February at 7pm at St. James' Church, Abinger Common*. There will be music performed by us and our friends, alongside a short presentation about our mission. Nibbles and drinks will be available, whilst we learn more about the Fountain of Peace, and the essential role community support plays in their

When the owner of the Daily Chronicle newspaper dies, and his son David Brooke (Strong) takes over, Jimmy quickly finds himself at odds with his new boss and his position under threat. In an attempt to preserve the power and influence he holds so sacred, Jimmy strikes a Faustian pact with struggling actress Nina Land (Arterton), entangling them and Brooke in a thrilling but deadly web of desire, blackmail and betrayal.

March 2025 we be will showing the following Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> March - A Hologram for The King – Adapted from a novel by Dave Eggers, the film tells the story of a down-on-his-luck businessman, who hopes to get back on track by travelling to Saudi Arabia to sell his new idea to a wealthy monarch. Alan Clay (Tom Hanks) arrives in the Middle East with a lot on his mind. Reeling from a recent bitter divorce and trying to stave off imminent foreclosure, he needs to land a career-saving IT contract by making a big sale to the king for a massive development in the desert. However, shortly after landing, still jetlagged and under intense pressure to deliver from his superiors back in Boston, Clay is dismayed to learn that the king is nowhere to be found. While Clay waits for what seems like an eternity in the desert, he befriends a local driver (Alexander Black) with an affinity for 80s rock, and shares flirtations with a Danish woman (Sidse Babett Knudsen). "You never know quite where this film is going, and in an era of so much cinematic predictability that's a welcome attribute." The cast also includes Ben Whishaw, Sarita Choudhury and Tom Skerritt. As usual, Tom Hanks makes this a very watchable film. Classification 12A (Running time is 1 hour 37 minutes). Start time is: 7.30

Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> March - Wilding – is a documentary based on Isabella Tree's best-selling book by the same title. It tells the incredible story of a couple that bets on nature for the future of their failing, four-hundred-year-old estate. the film follows the couple (Sir Charles Burrell and his conservationist wife, Isabella Tree), as they set to work with a ground-breaking vision, battling entrenched tradition and major forces along the way, daring to place the fate of their farm in the hands of nature. Ripping down the fences, they set the land back to the wild and entrust its recovery to a motley mix of animals both tame and wild. It is the beginning of a grand experiment that will become one of the most significant rewilding experiments in Europe and beyond. Classification PG (Running time is 1 hour 15 minutes).

#### January 2025 Meeting - Mike Hutchison: The Albury Neo-Gothic Church

We met in January with table decorations of fresh daffodils and New Year greetings. (This W.I. does things in style!) Our speaker was Mr. Mike Hutchinson and his subject the neo-Gothic church, up a drive, off the Albury Road. This is one of several churches in and around London built by the Catholic Apostolic Church, (not Roman Catholic) in 1840. The founding twelve called themselves Apostles, believing they had been called by God and that the Second Coming of Christ was imminent. At Albury the main red door is never opened because they believed that Christ would enter by this door. One of the apostles was Henry Drummond, then Lord of the Manor at Albury Park Mansion, who funded the building. As the Apostolic Movement spread across Europe to America many people still visit today. They can't go in so instead visit the Old Saxon church in Albury Park and make their donations to that church which benefits from the Apostolic Church being closed. Funds and maintenance of the Apostolic Church are managed by Trustees.

After this unusual talk, we had a bountiful tea provided by Jane White, Sheila Sturge and Jan Hunt (the table decorator) + helpers.

## GARDENS AND GREEN SPACES

## **Robin's Gardening Tips for February**

Hopefully the very bitter, freezing spell we had in January will not be repeated this month.

Primroses are starting to flower, and snowdrops are appearing. When they have flowered and are just starting to go over is the best time to split them. Replanting bulbs in smaller groups 'in the green' is the best way of increasing them in the garden.

There is still time to prune fruit trees, apples



and pears, but not stone fruits which should wait till summer. Wisterias, roses and summer flowering clematis should also be pruned now, and then given a feed of a general fertiliser.

If you want a really beautiful winter flowering clematis try planting clematis cirrhoses baleriac freckles. There is one growing high through an oak tree in Coldharbour lane which was in full flower in January. It likes to have its feet in the shade and tolerates dry soil in summer.

If you have a heated propagator or a spare windowsill, now is a good time to sow onions, melons, tomatoes, peppers and aubergines. Or why not wait till the Coldharbour village fete in May when I am sure some will be available. Why not grow a few extra plants for then anyway, especially if you are trying something different this year.

Should we get a repeat of January's weather please don't forget to feed and put out water for our feathered friends who help gardeners by eating the aphids and bugs we really don't need!


