This month our front cover photograph comes from Abinger Nursery. Do read about the children's fun with insects later in the mag.



Reflections from the Rectory

It may seem strange to some, to see an Anglian Priest quoting words from the Catholic Pope, but we are all part of the same universal church (catholic with a small 'c') and are all disciples of Jesus.



"Brothers, sisters... I speak to you, especially to those who no longer believe, no longer hope, no longer pray, because they think God has left. To those who are fed up with scandals, with misused power, with the silence of a Church that sometimes seems more like a palace than a home. I too, was angry with God. I too, saw good people die, children suffer, grandparents cry without medicine. And yes... there were days when I prayed and only felt an echo. But then I discovered something: God doesn't shout. God whispers. And sometimes He whispers from the mud, from pain, from a grandmother who feeds you without having anything.

I don't come to offer you perfect faith. I come to tell you that faith is a walk with stones, puddles, and unexpected hugs. I'm not asking you to believe in everything. I'm asking you not to close the door. Give a chance to the God who waits for you without judgment. I'm just a priest who saw God in the smile of a woman who lost her son... and yet she cooked for others. That changed me. So, if you're broken, if you don't believe, if you're tired of the lies...come anyway. With your anger, your doubt, your dirty backpack. No one here will ask you for a VIP card. Because this Church, as long as I breathe, will be a home for the homeless, and a rest for the weary. God doesn't need soldiers. He needs brothers and sisters. And you, yes, you.. are one of them."

I echo these words for our churches here, with love, Rev'd Kia 😊

COLDHARBOUR VE DAY 80 FETE





For most of us who live in Coldharbour and its surrounding areas we need little reminding of

how lucky we are. Occasionally an event takes place that just reinforces that

sentiment.

The Coldharbour VE Day-themed Village Fete was one of them on the 17th May. The stars were aligned for yet another



wonderful afternoon. A dedicated and hard-working organising committee, a loyal band of volunteers and stallholders (who do so much work before, during and after the event), so many stall donations, wall-to-wall sunshine, delicious food, great music from The Super Strings and Coldharbour's own village band, together with some wonderful vintage outfits and colourful red, white and blue bunting evoking the vibrant spirit of 1945.

Attendance records were broken with many visitors accompanied by their dogs who gave the Fun Dog Show judges some difficult decisions.



At the time of going to print, net proceeds are provisionally estimated to be just under £10,000 which will go towards maintaining the church, the village hall and the churchyard and to pay the regular and rapidly

escalating bills that come with the responsibility of looking after the church and its facilities. Charitable donations include the National Trust who do so much to protect and preserve our local area, and Dorking Friends of Cancer Research UK.

Mary Hustings sent us this article from the VE Day Stall at the Coldharbour fete.

Mary and Alan interviewed Harry Collis who is now 103. Sadly, his wife Mary has passed away.

HARRY COLLIS and memories of VE Day

Harry, a long-time resident of Coldharbour joined the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve after his 19th birthday in 1941. He served first in HMS Clematis, escorting six Atlantic Convoys. Then, after officer training, he was commissioned in 1942. He then served in Motor Gun Boats protecting East Coast Convoys, and in mid-1943 was en-route to a new posting in West Africa when the convoy was attacked by German aircraft, and two ships, including his, were sunk off Casablanca. Harry eventually arrived at his intended destination, Freetown, Sierra Leone, and spent 14 months in coastal defences there and in Lagos, Nigeria-

including an "unofficial" sortie as a rear-gunner in a Sunderland Flying Boat!

In 1945 Harry was in command of ML 1480 for its commissioning trials and a clockwise voyage around the UK from Whitstable to the Clyde before it was transported to the Far East. There he met up with two old friends from his West Africa days who were on a similar mission with other gun boats. And it was there that they celebrated VE Day Here is Harry's own description of the momentous day: "VE Day came while we were all in the Clyde and just afterwards, we were sent on leave." After 15 months in Naval Intelligence with the Pacific Fleet in Southeast Asia, Harry was eventually demobbed in September 1946. He celebrated his 103rd birthday two weeks ago.

About five years after VE Day, Harry married Mary (née Wright). Mary goes into a little more detail about VE Day in her memoir. She had been in Stockholm in neutral Sweden since 1939, the daughter of a member of the British Legation. "A red-haired young man ... ran over from his office across the way to break the news... We all rushed out shouting and cheering.... [At home] I found a large Union Jack waving from our ground-floor window, our doors wide open and people coming in to congratulate and celebrate; some known to us, some strangers.... Such excitement, such relief – a truly memorable day."

A warm welcome awaits you at the **Westcott Village Hub**, a vibrant Community Interest Company (CIC) now flourishing in St John's Hall, Westcott. But this thriving centre is more than just a place to shop and meet; it's a story of community spirit, born from a simple act of kindness and blossoming into a vital resource for all.

The journey of the Hub began as **Jon & Mum Groceries**, an initiative spearheaded by Jon and his mother during the challenging times of the Covid-19 pandemic. At its heart is a welcoming **café and shop** offering a delightful range of locally sourced produce (where possible), fresh bread, and delicious, value home-cooked meals – perfect for a light lunch or a friendly chat over coffee. It's a place designed to encourage community connection. You can also discover and support local artisans by browsing a selection of **local crafts**.

The Hub is a testament to the power of community action, providing a base for fantastic local initiatives. **The Community Fridge**: a vital service helping to reduce food waste and provide access to food for those in need. **The Westcott Community Garden**. born from the community's desire and the efforts of Green Westcott, this garden now sees up to 30 people cultivating not just fresh produce like tomatoes and artichokes, but also a strong sense of belonging and well-being.

The spirit of connection extends further, with the Hub having inspired open mic **poetry evenings** and popular Friday night **BBQs and curries** at the café, inviting everyone to eat, chat, and forge new friendships. The primary purpose of the Westcott Village Hub is to benefit the community and pursue social objectives. Any profits generated are reinvested to achieve these aims. The Hub is also continually looking to develop new **community groups and initiatives**.

Future plans include expanding volunteering and potential paid 'back to work' opportunities, creating a 'warm space' to combat isolation, establishing a community kitchen for collaborative cooking, developing

ABINGER COMMON & WOTTON W.I.

It was a Mayday meeting on one of those hot spring days. Also, the month of VE day which was commemorated by our tea hostesses (Val Belam, Felicity Francis and Dena Burrell) who prepared sandwiches (including Spam) and cakes which would have been possible at that time of rationing. Lesley introduced our speaker, Dr Jay Woogara, who told us the story of his extraordinary life.

Jay came from Mauritius, and showed a map and pictures of the island, which was originally colonised by the French but in 1810 was taken by the British (though the French still managed the land). Although slavery had recently been abolished, the British captured and brought Indians to work as indentured labourers on the sugar cane plantations – the conditions were as harsh as slavery and the French overseers were cruel. Jay's grandfather and father had come as one of these indentured labourers. His father died when Jay was three, leaving the family in greater poverty. Jay lived with his mother, grandmother and siblings in a two-room thatched hut in which their cow had one room. His grandmother looked after them, his mother worked in the cane fields and the children also worked there in the evenings and weekends. So, Jay's childhood was difficult - tattered clothes, no shoes, certainly no mod cons. medical care and education were expensive. Jay's education was partly funded by his grandmother's small pension, but also helped by a rich young friend who shared his books and lessons. He went to the capital for secondary school, staying with his married sister, and when he could not afford to continue there, the principal gave him private tuition. He also studied in the library because he was determined to get out of this deprived life. Eventually, aged 19, he succeeded in his application to come to England and went to Manchester University where he obtained a Ph.D. training first as a nurse and then as a lawyer, becoming a barrister. He bought a house, married an English woman and they had two daughters. He tried to settle his family back in Mauritius because he found the cultural change here shocking and wanted to return to his homeland, but his daughters could not cope there, so they returned to England. He commented that when he originally lived in Mauritius he did not realise how beautiful it was; in fact it is now a tourist destination with big hotels. GARDENS

Robin's Gardening Tips for June

Many plants and lawns are now suffering due to the very unusual and exceptionally dry late April and May. Grass will recover but we may not be so lucky with some plants. A good long drink is better for them than a mere sprinkle with a hose!



If you have lilies growing do check regularly for the horrid red lily beetle. At least it can be seen, and the best treatment is a heavy boot!

Thanks to no late frosts, the set on fruit trees this year seems very good. Give the trees, if possible, a good shake to get rid of some of the fruit. Known as the June drop, it is a natural way of thinning out fruit. Where possible, avoiding laden branches it is also the best time to prune stone fruits. If you have peach or nectarine trees the removal of all leaves affected by peach leaf curl can result in new unaffected leaves growing. The old leaves should be burnt or binned but not composted.

It is not too late to sow annuals for an autumn display when earlier flowers fade. An unpleasant problem which we gardeners can face in this area is ticks. As there are many deer and sheep around, ticks are prevalent. Do check carefully after gardening, especially if working where there is longer grass or if you have been weeding. They show up as black spots and need removing as soon as possible and then disinfecting the spot. If not removed they can cause potentially long-term serious health problems.

HEALTH

SALV The Gut in Health and Disease. Tim Austin reports:

On April 16th Dr Ozan Hanci, Consultant Paediatrician and gastroenterology specialist at the Royal Surrey County Hospital, gave a

fascinating and erudite talk about our guts and how to look after them.

Beginning with a detailed look at coeliac disease in its various forms, he went on to discuss the role of gluten as a dietary trigger; the importance



of allowing children to talk openly about bowel movements (a 'Choose Your Poo!' poster with which he encourages youngsters to identify what their stool samples look like), the difference between irritable bowel syndrome and inflammatory bowel disease; ulcerative colitis and Crohn's disease.

Medical advances are being made constantly but progress can be slow, and meanwhile all these gut problems are on the rise globally. Diet plays a big part in this.

He ended by emphasising the importance of day-by-day healthy living to protect your gut, including exercise, good sleeping patterns and variety in diets, including avoidance of ultra-processed foods, eating more fruit and veg and more fibre, switching to olive oil in cooking and enjoying reasonable amounts of black coffee, dark chocolate, and wine – though he surprised us by suggesting that wine was best taken early in the day! rather than late at night.

Bearing that in mind, the audience then engaged Dr Hanci in a lively Q&A session before partaking (somewhat cautiously, not to say abstemiously) in a glass of wine while chatting with the speaker and his family, as well as with the doctors from Shere Surgery, to conclude an informative and goodnatured evening.

News from Shere Surgery

Many of you will have been very frustrated by the lack of access in recent months. Despite investing in more doctors, the demand for our services has increased to unmanageable levels. We have had to take urgent cases only earlier and earlier in the day and we have reached the point that our current system, "Ask My GP", is sadly no longer fit for purpose. If all goes to plan, by the time this goes to print, we will have started a new system called "Accu Rx".

One of the key differences is that arranging appointments in advance will now be possible. When you get in touch with the surgery, one of the doctors will be assessing each request to help work out the best way forward. This may be an appointment with a doctor or nurse practitioner on the same day for urgent cases, or you may receive a booking link so you can book a slot yourself with the person you need to see or speak with. One of the best parts about it is that you will be able to book when it suits you, rather than waiting for a call all day which can be a bit inconvenient.

Online requests will remain the preferred and main route of contacting the surgery but making appointments by phone will also continue to be available for those who cannot use the online system. You will be able to see what is available and choose the slot that works for you. We hope this change will be one that is welcomed and will welcome any suggestions on how to make it even better.

Another advent is a new service called "East to West". This is aimed at children, young people, and their families. It consists of a team of counsellors and support workers who work locally to help those who are finding life challenging, particularly with respect to mental health and behavioural problems. A key theme of East to West is to offer hope and suggest practical solutions to support the patient and those around them. Many of you will have noticed a new face in our medical team – Dr Johann Panthakey has joined us for a four-month period, bringing with him a fresh wave of youthful enthusiasm. He was once an optometrist but retrained as a doctor and, after his time with us, plans to train as a specialist in ophthalmology. We feel fortunate to have him with us.

I wish you all a rejuvenating and enjoyable summer from its official onset on 21st June and will close with a reminder from the Bard; "summer's lease hath all too short a date", so we must make the most of it! Dr Douglas Wardrop

A Place of Safety: The people of Dorking and the surrounding villages have given generous support to those in need on many occasions. The Museum's

It starts with the eminent group of émigrés fleeing the French Revolution in

1792 and taking up residence in Juniper Hall on the slopes of Box Hill. In the 20th century, they were followed by those fleeing the Kaiser's army in 1914, Nazi oppression in the late 1930s, and the Blitz in 1940. The story continues in the present century with refugees from war and persecution in the Middle East.
