Abinger Common & Wotton WI

Once again our talk highlighted a charity working to assist our health and wellbeing. Gerry Bennett told us about SERV Surrey & London, a service providing out-of-hours support to 20 hospitals. They transport blood products, urgent samples and medical supplies, along with donated breast milk, to hospitals and milk banks across Surrey & London. They also carry out a daily delivery of



blood to Air Ámbulance Kent Surrey Šussex (a charity that we had a talk about at a WI meeting some months ago). During normal working hours the blood stored at blood banks is ordered in advance by hospitals and then delivered by the Blood Transfusion Service, but it would be uneconomic to keep staff on duty for unexpected needs that may crop up overnight. SERV is staffed fully by volunteers, comprising drivers, controllers, and fund raisers. The drivers may use one of the ex-police motorbikes available, or their own cars or motorbikes. Gerry, after retirement as school headteacher, first worked through all the home jobs on his list, then looked around for an occupation where he was not required to be in charge and organise other people. This volunteer role has given him great satisfaction over the past 10 years, doing as instructed, meeting lovely people, having fun, and fulfilling a worthwhile purpose.

Pat's Aussie Adventure



At 82 years young, Patricia Camp of Abinger Common embarked on an extraordinary solo journey that would take her across continents and deep into the heart of Australia's wildest frontiers. Her adventure was so remarkable, it could be titled: "I'm from Abinger. Get me out of here!"

Patricia's odyssey began at Gatwick Airport, where she boarded a flight bound for Tasmania, with layovers in Singapore and Melbourne. In Hobart, she reunited with an old school friend, spending a week exploring the island's rugged coastlines and enjoying early morning dog walks along serene beaches. Next, Patricia flew to Adelaide to board The Ghan, one of the world's most iconic train journeys. This 2,979-kilometre expedition traverses Australia's vast interior from south to north, offering passengers a unique blend of comfort and adventure.

Aboard The Ghan, Patricia experienced the changing landscapes—from the pastoral hues of South Australia's plains to the rusty Red Centre and the tropical greens of the Top End. She enjoyed sumptuous dining, an elegant private cabin, and attentive service, all while forging connections with fellow travellers, namely Raymond and Jacob.

From Darwin, Patricia flew to Cairns. Despite a minor dental mishap—a broken tooth—she quickly sought out a local dentist, ensuring she was ready for the next leg of her adventure.

The pinnacle of Patricia's journey was a 12-day off-road expedition to Cape York Peninsula, Australia's northernmost point. This remote wilderness is renowned for its rugged beauty, rich Indigenous culture, and historical significance.

Travelling via 4WD, the small group ventured through challenging terrains, including river crossings and dense rainforests. They visited Cooktown, a town steeped in history as the site of Captain James Cook's first interaction with Indigenous Australians

Once back on solid ground, they continued their journey, eventually reaching the tip of Cape York, where the land meets the sea—a moment of triumph and reflection.

Lucy Pakenham and Rosie McCance's Uganda Adventure

Volunteering at the Fountain of Peace

Many of you have kept up to date with our adventures to Uganda and have been incredibly kind on our arrival home (when we were pretty sick). However now we are out of those woods, I wanted to share a few of our experiences.

We were out there from the 17th - 25th of April which meant we were there for all of the Easter fun! On Good Friday on our long drive from Entebbe (where we flew into) to Kyenjojo (where the project is) we many saw church



processions carrying large crosses along the roads, whilst singing and praying. Uganda is a predominantly Christian country so Easter time was colourful, as you can imagine.

As soon as we arrived we were greeted by William, a lead member of the Fountain of Peace Children's Foundation, who was our guide throughout our trip. On Friday we arrived at the project, which felt like a paradise as soon as you drove in. We were there in the rainy season, so it was incredibly luscious, and the view from the project was amazing. As well as this, the children ran down to the car to greet us, and instantly curious chatter and laughter was heard all around us. We were greeted by many of the nannies and all 89 children. We were just surrounded by joy.

At the beginning of the week Rosie and I went round each house with gifts we had brought, meeting and bonding with all the older children. Each house sang us a song, introduced themselves, and gave us a tour of their house. Within the project we were to help in the baby section feeding, praying, and playing most mornings. We also took part in morning devotionals led by the chaplain, as well as being taken on community walks and going on a tour around the school. The afternoons were carved out as time to play with the older children. They have a very organised structure where they help with chores and school work in the mornings before being able to play in the afternoon. We played games such as capture the flag, egg and spoon race and sack races. They introduced us to many other chants and games too.



Whilst we were there we also had the opportunity to go on a Safari and to visit the hot springs, (self-funded). On the game drive and boat tour we saw elephants, hippos, buffalo, crocodiles, lizards, leopards and many others. It was definitely a once in a lifetime experience. We also drove into the mountains to visit the hot springs which have an amazing

story linked to the tribe who live in the mountains. There is a female and male hot spring because they believe that a man went missing in one and a woman went missing in the other... feel free to have a google. We also got to boil eggs in the water which was also pretty cool.

Our accommodation was eventful. Unlike other volunteer groups, we stayed in a motel where many of the nannies and teachers for the project live, as it is just down the road from the project. Living with the nannies meant we had some enlightening conversations and made good friends with a girl called Arabella (the nursery teacher) who might even come over to visit us! For a few days we had no running water and definitely no hot water, so the owner would bring us jerry cans full of boiling water which we would pour into the sink and use to wash with. The lights worked sometimes and the bugs were fun. What I will say is that Rosie and I decided to share a room and that saved us because these things became incredibly funny and are now memories we will share forever. Such as washing each other's hair and fighting bugs with crocs in the early hours of the morning.

On our last day at the project we had a leaving service which moved us quite a lot because the charity was such a beautiful place to be. As Rosie said, it is very hard to be sad in such a wonderful place.

Overall, it was such an amazing experience and we are already jealous of the next group going out in the summer. Rosie and I are pretty bonded for life and will be naming our own children after the babies we fell in love with out there.

A frequently brilliant film looking at hopefully, just a fictionalized version of America destroying itself from within. Classification 12A (Running time is 1 hours 49 minutes). Start time is: 7.30

Sunday 13th July – The Longest Day – is the 1962 American epic war film based on Cornelius Ryan's 1959 non-fiction book of the same name about the D-Day landings in Normandy on June 6, 1944. The film takes care to show how the event was perceived by Allied and Axis soldiers and commanders, as well as the Free French resistance. It features an all-star cast including: John Wayne, Richard Burton, Kurt Jurgens, Richard Todd, Robert Michum and even a cameo by Sean Connery! The superb

black and white photography adds yet another layer of realism. It is still a classic after 43 years! Classification 12A (Running time is 3 hours). Note: Start time is 7pm.

Thursday 7th August - Wicked - is based on the blockbuster stage musical Wicked and is the untold story of the witches of Oz. Elphaba (Cynthia Erivo) is a young woman, misunderstood because of her unusual green skin, who has yet to discover her true power, and Glinda



(Ariana Grande) is a popular young woman, gilded by privilege and ambition, who has yet to discover her true heart. The two meet as students, at Shiz University in the fantastical Land of Oz, and forge an unlikely but profound friendship. This film promises a froth of pink and green escapism but delivers considerably more in the way of depth and darkness and 'Cynthia Erivo and Ariana Grande make the magic happen'! Classification PG, (Running time is 2 hours 40 minutes).

MUSIC IN DORKING – JULY 2025 by Ian Codd


July 12th at 4.00, Leatherhead Choral Society in Tithe Barn, Bookham, £18



GARDENS

Robin's gardening tips for the Summer



Most years we would be hoping for more sun, this year most gardeners are hoping for more rain! Even washing up water thrown over plants can help to keep plants alive and thriving. Thanks to the rain over the winter though, roses this year seem better than ever. Don't forget to deadhead!



If growing sweet peas they benefit from daily picking, enjoy them in the house as well as the garden. There is still plenty of time to sow more vegetables especially things like carrots, peas and even courgettes, though these will need watering to get established.

As some perennial plants die right back in winter, why not take photos of favourite areas now to serve as

reminder if you want to plant spring bulbs.

As earlier flowers die off why not save the seeds ready to sow next year. Don't forget to label the envelopes. Ripening soft fruits need picking daily or the birds may get there first. I have noticed that pigeons seem to delight in just pecking off the fruit before it is ripened and dropping it on the ground. If possible cover bushes with netting or horticultural fleece.

But if the sunny weather continues, just sit and enjoy your garden, at least if plants are affected by drought then so are the weeds!

District Councillor Update for July 2025

It's been a busy few months at Mole Valley District Council, and we wanted to share some key updates — including changes on the horizon that could reshape the way local government works across Surrey.

First, some good news: Mole Valley's Local Plan has been shortlisted for the Royal Town Planning Institute's Awards for Planning Excellence. It's a welcome recognition of the work being done locally — and two standout policies have drawn particular national praise:


• A requirement for all new developments to deliver a net gain in biodiversity, helping protect and enhance our countryside and wildlife.

 \cdot A commitment that at least 40% of new homes be affordable — supporting young people, local families, and key workers who want to stay rooted in our communities.

The biggest change ahead, however, is the Government's plan for Local Government Reorganisation (LGR). At present, Surrey operates under a two-tier system: the County Council manages highways, education, and social care, while Mole Valley District Council looks after planning, housing, waste collection, and leisure.

Under LGR, these services would be merged into one or more unitary authorities — single councils delivering all local functions. The Government's aim is to reduce duplication, increase efficiency, and allow for stronger local decision-making.

As part of this, the May County Council elections were cancelled, and all local authorities in Surrey have been asked to submit their proposals for how the new structure should work.



Valley Mole has backed the twounitary model. where Surrey would be split into East and Under West. this plan, Mole Valley would join Reigate & Banstead, Epsom & Elmbridge, Ewell, and Tandridge to form an East Surrey Authority.

We believe this model balances efficiency with accountability. It is small enough to remain responsive to local concerns, while still delivering the benefits of scale. Crucially, it meets the criteria laid out by the Government — and provides for at least two councillors per division, protecting local representation.

Of course, reorganisation brings challenges. While long-term savings are expected, the transition will be complex, and many details remain unclear — particularly regarding funding, assets, and local services.

That's why we've joined colleagues in calling for safeguards: Three councillors per division

• Flexibility to create new town or parish councils in currently unparished areas

 \cdot Protection of valued community assets — like libraries and leisure centres

• Continued focus on climate targets

• A fair funding settlement — including writing off high-risk council debts (such as Woking and Spelthorne) which would otherwise be shared by residents in the new authorities

Both in Abinger and Coldharbour there are already Parish Councils — and that makes a difference.

With the eventual abolition of Mole Valley District Council, Parish Councils will play a crucial role in representing communities and preserving local identity. Whether it's safeguarding public spaces, ensuring accountability, or protecting the areas' historic character, Parish Councils may find themselves stepping into a more prominent role in the coming years.

That's why now is the time to start preparing — cataloguing our assets, considering how best to maintain local oversight, and ensuring our voices are heard as the new authorities are designed.

While other areas may soon be exploring the formation of parish councils for the first time, Abinger and Capel already have a platform in place — and with it, an opportunity to shape the next chapter of local government from the ground up.

That said, several questions remain:

• How will parish councils be supported after LGR?

• What will happen to community-run services previously managed by the District Council?

 \cdot How will public views be collected and acted upon in forming the new authorities?

• And how can we make sure rural communities like Abinger and Coldharbour remain visible in a larger, more centralised system?

LGR Timeline at a Glance:

- Dec 2024 Government publishes Devolution White Paper
- · Feb 2025 County Council elections cancelled
- May 2025 Proposals for new unitaries submitted
- Summer–Autumn 2025 Government reviews proposals
- Early 2026 Shadow Authorities formed
- May 2026 Elections to new councils
- · April 2027 New authorities take full control

Mole Valley District Council will continue to serve residents up to 2027 and we're determined to make sure our own history, heritage, and priorities are protected throughout this transition.

Worry not if this date does not work for you, as Chris is planning to hold these meetings across the District with Box Hill planned in September, and Capel and Abinger also on his list.
