

Abinger Common and Wotton WI July meeting

Many of us know Pat O'Brien who lives in Abinger, and it is a delight to find that she gave a talk to the WI about her working life at the BBC for their July meeting. The photo shows her working on a film about St Augustine in N Africa. It was an unplanned and impromptu talk as Pat actually the was designated minute



taker! So here is Pat's write up of the July meeting.

We met in the Wotton Hall on a hot afternoon. Our President welcomed us, reminded members of the upcoming Summer Lunch, and told us that our speaker had cancelled the night before! My offer to talk about my years working at the BBC was accepted, so I am afraid it's me talking about my own talk!

I explained that I had to leave school in the middle of my Alevels. However, my father said I could do a secretarial training. At the end of this training, recruitment people came to the college looking for new staff. They were mostly businesspeople, but one such person was a script editor from the BBC - so that is how I started working there, aged 17, as a junior secretary.

I started in BBC radio as a maid of all work, mornings in *Religion* in the Langham Hotel, afternoons in *Talks* in Broadcasting House, and then I became a radio producer's secretary.

When one of the producers in *Religion*, Vernon Sproxton (they were all ordained ministers), moved to television in Shepherd's Bush, I applied to be his Production Secretary. I worked with him for the next sixteen years. He thought religious broadcasting should be far more than broadcast services. We made a series of films about church and community life in different areas: C. of E. in Surrey, Roman Catholic Churches in industrial Lancashire, Congregational Chapels in the sheep farming valley of Swaledale, the hot-gospelling sects of Belfast and the

Wee Frees on the Isle of Lewis. I often did taped interviews for use as what we called 'wild track', over film sequences. It was fascinating. The other series I particularly enjoyed making were 40-minute documentaries for BBC-2 on The Life and Thoughts of... great religious thinkers. We filmed in France for programmes on Simone Weil, Teilhard de Chardin and Blaise Pascal; in Denmark for Soren Kierkegaard and Italy and N. Africa for St Augustine of Hippo. My job involved basic secretarial work, plus typing scripts, listing and timing shots and continuity when filming, cueing the narrator when dubbing, and calling camera shots for studio gallery work. I also often chose the music. It was my university. My fellow members seemed to enjoy the talk and I answered questions before having our tasty tea prepared by Sandy Hodge, Debbie Skeil and Annie Chesterton. (And a lovely bunch of flowers was delivered to me the next day.)




The choir meet for 2 hours every Tuesday at 7.30 at St. John's C of E Primary School, Dorking, RH4 2LR. No auditions required.

Sing with the Surrey Hills Choir by Christine Parrott

"Choir is such a big part of my life, it keeps my mind busy and my heart happy" (Mia)

I have been singing for virtually all my life. It is one of the most important and fulfilling things that I do, and I love it! I've sung in large choirs attached to the UK's most prestigious orchestras; small, intimate cabaret groups with a few voices and instrumentalists, church choirs, teenage wannabe poppy groups and just about everything in between, but the absolute highlight has been my time singing with the Surrey Hills Chamber Choir. I can honestly say that as well as being a choir with high musical standards (I was proud to win the national Adult Choir of the year with them), it is one of the friendliest musical groups I've been in.

SHCC started out 20 years ago and we've just had a very successful anniversary concert celebrating this landmark with so many alumni singers joining us that we doubled in number. A tribute to the strong friendships forged and maintained.

I was attracted to the choir because it was something different from what I had done before. We cover a very wide repertoire – from early polyphonic music to the short but complex choral works by 21st century composers such as Whitaker, Todd and Chilcott. As well as singing in the classical style we also sing gospel and spirituals, popular songs and madrigals, folk and traditional, and everything we sing is geared towards a memorable experience for our audiences.



We perform from memory and often unconducted. This requires a certain amount of dedication and extra effort, but it is all worth it as our audiences love the stories we paint and the connections we make with them. Every voice is valued and as a result the totality of the choir is greater than its individuals.

We perform two concerts a year in Guildford and our much-loved Christmas concert is frequently a sell-out, but the highlights are usually the away performances. This is often in competition where we meet other similar choirs from around the world. We've taken part in the International Eisteddfod in Llangollen, the Amateur Choral Competition in Manchester and have travelled to many places, including Cardiff, Vienna and Barcelona for festivals and competition. We have been able to win classes in most of the competitions we've entered and that gives us a real buzz!

Although our singers have different backgrounds and experiences and cover a wide age range, we love singing together and enjoy the opportunity to socialise that our travels bring. So, not just a choir, but a group of friends, sharing, supportive and showcasing our love of singing. Sight-reading is not essential, resources are available, but experience and ability to hold a harmony part is required.

We rehearse in Guildford on Wednesdays, 7.30pm at the United Reformed Church, Guildford. Rehearsals recommence Wednesday 3rd September

Our sister choir, the Surrey Hills Singers, is a female choir. This relaxed, unauditioned choir meet on a Monday morning at Ewhurst Baptist Church. GARDENS





With the very long hot dry spell which we have had, many plants are showing signs of stress. Don't despair, leave plants in the ground - many will shoot away from the base once we have some decent rains.



But gardening jobs never end! The long very whippy shoots on wisterias need cutting back to 4-5 leaves. This will help keep them under control and encourage flowering next year.

Plum trees and other stone fruits need pruning as soon as fruit is picked and certainly by the end of this month. Pruning any later may mean the tree

developing a disease called silver leaf which used to be notifiable. This

weakens the tree and causes its ultimate demise!


Despite the dryness, slugs seem to be abundant. Where plants are in pots, a copper band round the rim is a good



deterrent. With plants in the ground, an old-fashioned, but useful method is to place the half skins of oranges or grapefruit upside down near favoured plants. Slugs love these and collect underneath, a good dressing of salt then helps them on their way!

Seed and bulb catalogues are winging their way now. Whilst there are many to choose from, why not order and try a useful bulb-more expensive than gold - and that is saffron. The stamens of which, when removed and dried, supply the spice.

The soil in this area is good for growing rhododendrons and camellias, and Camellia sinensis - Assam tea can be grown here



Finally, this year has been great for butterflies, but I do wish they disliked cabbages! The only real safe way to treat them is to remove all caterpillars by hand and use a fine net to cover the cabbages to stop butterflies laying eggs on them in the first place.

Autumn also brings with it another round of vaccinations. Once again, we have to order these well in advance to enable our staff to administer them on time – we are very keen to avoid wastage and unused vials so please do come and get vaccinated at Shere, and ensure you keep your appointment so we can help protect as many patients as possible.

Please see below for dates and eligibility for 2025:

Flu jab. Pregnant women and all eligible children will start from 1st September. School aged patients (administered at their schools), vaccinations should be completed by 12th Dec with further catch-up opportunities. All other adult patients: 1st Oct and until 31st March 2026.

Covid jab. This will run from 1st October 2025 to 31st January 2026 Adults aged 75 years and over. Residents in care homes for older adults and Individuals who are immunosuppressed aged 6 months and over.

Please note – this is a change from Autumn 2024 which had included adults aged 65-74 years and all those aged 6 months and over in a clinical risk group. (This is correct at the time of going to press but for up-to-date details, in case of any changes, please refer to our web site.)
