Leith Hill Big Band Concert in October



In mid-October Leith Hill Big Band presented an afternoon of classics from the swing era to a packed audience in Christ Church. Funds from the event went towards the new handrail installed next to the steps on the path between the church and the John Venus Hall, raising over one thousand pounds.

To me the big band era is still alive. Hearing big band music is my way of feeling joyful. Count Basie, Duke Ellington, John Dankworth and Woody Herman were childhood heroes. I love the sound and fury of a big band at full blast. So, this event could not be missed. And I was not disappointed. The band is full-sized and that is a very hard thing to achieve. Five saxes, three trumpets, three trombones and a rhythm section with not only a piano and drums but several guitars and basses also. They played many favourites - Basie's April in Paris, Miller's American Patrol and Moonlight Serenade, Kenton's Peanut Vendor, Ellington's It Don't Mean a Thing and several other chart hits. They are still a new outfit but are already amazingly good. Big bands work well when they sound together and play as if they are like a single force. And force is a good word for them. They make a very big sound but are also capable of a wide and surprising range of volume, tempo and rhythmicality. And they play as one most of the time. Congratulations to them all for an astounding achievement. Surely the number of big bands in English villages could be counted on the hands of one finger. The band was brought together and led by alto sax player Debby Chapman.

Christmas Stamps

It is time again to send Christmas cards. It is now rather expensive. 87 pence for 2nd class and almost twice as much for 1st class at £1.70, but again, Graham Mytton is at hand to assist. He buys large quantities of stamps that come from the collections of deceased collectors. They are available at a discount because there are few new collectors starting the hobby and so there is a glut. He is not selling anything that is now not valid for postage. But all special issues, usually called commemoratives (you almost never see them on sale or on mail because Royal Mail tries not to make them available!) will be always valid for postage. Many people like using them because it makes their mail look very attractive.

This year he provides a price list:

Actual 1st class stamps @ £1.70 each at any Post Office, you can have them for £1.25 each. Imagine that. And of course, no matter what happens to the price, they will always be valid for 1st class mail in the UK. At the current rate of postal inflation which is well above the RPI it is a good investment.

He does not have any 2nd class @ 85p. The few he gets all go to the Shop @ the Plough. But he makes up the value by combining 2, 3, 4 or 5 stamps to make 87p. 2nd class combinations are priced as follows:

2nd class with 2 stamps (£0.87 at any Post Office). Only 74p each

2nd class with 3 stamps. Only 72p each

2nd class with 4 stamps. Only 7op each

And Graham can supply stamps also for mail to the rest of the world. Provided that your card weighs no more than 100g the Royal Mail cost per card is £3.20. 2 stamp combinations are very difficult to make but for between 3 and 6 stamp combinations, he can give discounts that depend on the number of stamps to be used. Prices from £2.40 to £2.72 each.

He can also help with parcels of any size or weight and to anywhere at all.

Graham makes a profit, and this is halved between our two parishes as in the past. And he adds 25% UK tax. Buy early because he may run out with no time to get more. Call or text 07854324571 or email gmytton@gn.apc.org.





We say goodbye

Linda Dawe



Linda Dawe, a long time Coldharbour resident of one of the former foresters' houses in Crockers Lane, died in October. She was born in 1944 in Wallasey, Merseyside, to Leonard and Dorothy Jones, both of Welsh heritage. When Linda was born, her father was serving with the Eighth Army in North Africa. The family lived in Liverpool, which was subject at times to very heavy bombing raids that devastated large areas of the city. It was a traumatic time. Linda had a sister, Penny, born fourteen years later. Linda cared for her baby sister a lot. Mother and

father had some difficulties following their stressful wartime experiences.

Linda and Tony Dawe, a well-known and respected journalist who was at the Times for a large part of his career, moved to Coldharbour more than 50 years ago. Their children, Katina and Lynton grew up here. Tony was very involved with the Cricket Club and it was Linda who regularly helped with the teas. Tony died in 2017.

Linda loved theatre, dance, poetry, literature and country life. She was an active villager and every year she managed a toy stall at the annual Coldharbour Fête. At her funeral, members of her family spoke movingly of Linda's her dedicated care, kindness, gentleness and selflessness.

Some years ago happened to bump into the actor Timothy West, of Prunella husband Scales. the near telephone box iust opposite Goddards Abinger. I said surprised hello and only remembered it a couple of years later when I saw an episode of Tim and Pru's Great Canal

Journeys in which they visited Sutton Abinger in 'Darkest Surrey'. It emerged that this is where Pru had been born. Brian Morgan, my coeditor at the time, and I had the idea of inviting her to Abinger to do an interview for the Parish News, and Pru and Tim came to see us. This was exactly 10 years ago in November 2015. We realised then what Timothy West had been doing here – visiting Prunella's childhood home. They had been staying in Goddards together with their children and grandchildren.

We were sad to learn of Timothy West's death last year, and sadly Prunella died this year, on 27th October. Pru was so devoted to Tim that it seems fitting that she should have followed him so soon after.

Brilliant actress Prunella Scales was born in 1932 in The Forge (now The Old Forge) opposite the Volunteer pub in Sutton Abinger, and lived there until 1937 when her parents, the Illingworths, bought a house in Westcott. Then at the outbreak of World War II, her mother took the children away from danger to more remote parts of the country. When the war ended they returned to live at Kempslade, Friday Street, where Pru lived from 1946 until 1950 when she went to The Old Vic Drama School and began her acting career.

Prunella took the name Scales, and also her acting talent, from her mother, Bim, whose maiden name was Scales. Bim had been a professional actress and later acted in amateur productions. While living in Westcott Bim took part in E.M. Forster's England's Pleasant Land in 1938 with music by Vaughan Williams. When the family came back to Friday Street after the war Bim continued to act with the Westcott Players. There she became friendly with Jean Ridgers, who many people in Abinger remember well.

THE WOTTON HATCH

Pru's visit here ten years ago was a delight. Her memories of her childhood home were vivid. We had a drink in the pub in Sutton Abinger just opposite the house where she was born. We had lunch at the Wotton Hatch where she had walked to every morning from Kempslade to catch the bus. She remembered leaving her muddy boots in the pub after her walk across the fields.

We visited the churchyard at Wotton Church where she found her parents'

grave.

We visited Friday Street which was very familiar to her, and she saw Kempslade from a

distance. We went to see Christine and Jack Padgham in their cottage in Friday Street, because Jack, who is sadly no longer with us, had known the family well in those days.

Pru and Tim paid a final visit to Abinger in 2016 when Pru came to read the lesson in St James', a chance for her to perform, which she still

adored doing. This was followed by lunch in the pub and a visit to her old friends Robert and Cherry Clarke at Abinger Manor Cottage.

Lovely memories of a lovely lady!

And now over to Cherry, who knew Pru and her family well.

Cherry's memories of Pru

"When I came to Abinger in 1963 the Illingworths were living at Chandlers Farm. Robert used to drive up to his law practice in Gray's Inn and if Pru had an acting job in London he would take Pru with him. A strong friendship had developed between the families, so when Robert and I got engaged they gave an engagement party for us at Chandlers Farm."

"Tim was interested in the history of the area and wrote about how the Normans came to erect the Motte and Bailey, which you can see on the left if you walk down the footpath from the church. He made an audio recording of this, which we played to the people who came to the Abinger Fair and was very popular. I still have this somewhere!"

"Although Pru and Tim were very busy and successful in their careers, in the summer they used to come down to Goddards, the famous Lutyens House in Abinger, with a crowd of acting friends. Robert and I would join them. Pru found these times exacting and tiring as you can imagine, because the job of organising the catering, lunches etc. always fell to her. When she was let down on a couple of occasions, I would get a frantic

call to find her a cook."

"Pru was a lovely, generous friend and in 1992 she came to Abinger to talk to volunteers and children at a fundraising lunch for the 'Volunteer Reading Help' charity which I ran. Prunella and the poet Wendy Cope were the guests of honour. Children from Abinger Common School attended and enjoyed being read to by Prunella and Wendy."

I have strong and enduring memories of Pru and also her family. We all derived great pleasure from watching the Great Canal Journeys, while holding our breath in case she fell in! Farewell, dear Pru, on your final journey.

December in your Garden

Though Christmas is fast approaching, work in a garden is really never ending! If, after the bumper fruit harvest of this year, branches were broken, now is the time to remove them! And generally, prune apple and pear trees. Roses can also be pruned back now to prevent damage caused by possible 'wind' rock. It's also a good idea to rake up all rose leaves, especially if there has been evidence of black spot. This was once treated by the generous application of soot.

Leaves should be cleared from lawns and mixed in with compost. Though don't worry too much about flower beds, the leaves will help protect more vulnerable plants. If you are splitting established perennials why not pot up a few bits for the fete plant stalls next year. However, do leave hydrangeas alone till the spring, the flower heads providing protection for emerging shoots.

In the vegetable garden, why not dig a trench where you plan to grow runner beans next year, gradually filling it with compostable kitchen waste, covering it with soil as you gradually fill it. This will help give the beans a good start. Once you have demolished the contents of a Quality



Street Christmas gift, compost their wrappers as well. They are now made of cellulose from wood pulp and will quickly rot down.

If and when we get some hard frosts, remember to keep off the grass, to prevent damage.

Our feathered friends may need help. Disinfect feeders, and please keep them supplied with suitable food and if need be, water.

Finally, cold days and dark evenings mean one thing, a relaxing time with a seed catalogue ready for next year.

SALV AGM

The many people who came to the AGM and Autumn Open Evening of the Shere and Local Villages Health Trust were treated to exciting news on the development of the Graham Tyrrell Wing, the proposed extension to Shere Surgery. Adrian O'Loughlin, SALV Chairman, reported that planning consent had just been given for the new wing, which is to be at the eastern end of the present Surgery building, parallel with Gomshall Lane. It will have four new consulting rooms together with a small waiting area and a toilet and will help hugely with easing the space pressures for the doctors and ancillary staff who are now struggling to cope with a patient list approaching 9,000 (the original building was designed to handle a list of some 6,000). Adrian announced the formal launch of a campaign to raise £300,000 for the two-cabin extension, to cover the building and fitting-out costs as well as sympathetic landscaping. If all goes according to plan, it is hoped to start construction next spring.

Our impressive speaker was local orthopaedic consultant, Simon Thompson, who gave an excellent talk entitled Do I Need a Knee Operation? This was followed by a demonstration of how to keep our knees in peak condition by local physiotherapist and Pilates expert Helen Esplen.

Update on Local Government Reorganisation



The government has concluded its review of Local Government Reorganisation in Surrey, deciding to proceed with a two-unitary council model. As of April 2027, the county will be governed by two new authorities, East Surrey and West Surrey.

A transition to the new unitary councils will begin with elections

for "shadow" authorities in May 2026. These elected representatives will oversee the setup of the new councils. The change will culminate on April 1st, 2027, when the new councils officially replace the 12 current councils, which will be dissolved on March 31, 2027.

There will be no immediate changes to how residents access services. Council offices and community spaces will remain open, and services will continue as usual.
